To Whom it Concerns:

I am for the retention of net metering rights for roof top solar panels as they existed prior to the decision passed in SB100 by the 2019 legislature. Here's why: First, it pits a national lobby of fossil fuel monopolies against burgeoning local grassroots entrepreneurs acting in the interests of sound environmental practices. Second, are the moral and environmental issues. The fossil fuel industry has been aware since the seventies that the products they were promoting (the mining, processing and distribution), were harmful to the earth and the primary cause of climate change.

Over the intervening years, their attempts at denial have fallen short as the earth's temperature has risen along with concomitant disasters.
