RE: City of Princeton Wholesale Water Increase

Dear Ms. Pinson;

I am enclosing information regarding the water rate increase which recently passed the second reading of the City of Princeton Water and Wastewater Commission. This increase will affect the members of the Caldwell County Water District and the Lyon County Water District; hence, the need for PSC involvement.

For the past several years, I have worked to understand the various rate structures used by utilities and most recently accepted help from the University of North Carolina Environmental Finance Center. An affordability study was completed which indicated our declining and aging population was considered vulnerable. This, coupled with little to no industrial growth and with a water treatment plant utilization of only 50% - 55%, led all parties to agree that it was time to ditch the declining block rate structure and move to a more fair and equitable method. We initiated phase one with our city water customers in August and switched entirely to a uniform flat rate with our sewer customers at the same time and our largest industrial customers saw their rates increase significantly. Our board made the decision that the largest users should no longer be subsidized by the smallest and most vulnerable.

We then took up the task of looking at the wholesale rates. A meeting was held with representatives from the respective water districts on October 22, 2019 in order to outline the facts which led to the need for the increase and to allow each district ample notice so that they could plan accordingly. At the meeting, our Commission Chairman, Bob Hayes, along with Superintendent James Noel and I, presented historical data on the expenses incurred at the water treatment facility and the method used to calculate the unit cost to produce and distribute 100 cubic feet of water. Since the last rate increase in 2014, the total cost of production has increased

almost \$327,000 while consumption trends lower. Current data indicates the cost to produce and distribute 1,000 gallons of water has risen to \$5.03, much higher than the \$3.95 we are requesting our wholesale customers pay. Records were also provided defining the increasing gap between the rate tiers representing the lowest and highest volume water users which led to our decision to take the first steps to replace the declining block structure. In this first step, we have narrowed the gap between our tiers and eliminated one of the previous four tiers. We believe this approach is fair and equitable to all. Copies of the aforementioned information were given to those in attendance and the formal notice of a rate increase was supplied the next day.

In speaking with Mr. Cayce from Lyon County, he stated they have no plans to request an intervention. However, I received word from Mrs. Fralick at Caldwell County and she stated her board "thought the increase was excessive" and they were going to discuss with the PSC. I understand that in terms of percentages a 30% increase sounds excessive; however, when \$0.90 per 1,000 gallons is added to the Caldwell County customers' minimum bill of \$25.17 it only results in a 3.6% increase. We have no control over why the water we sell to them at \$3.05 is marked-up 825% and we have even "floated" the idea of regionalization with them because we feel their customers could potentially realize a significant decrease in the cost of water if we were to merge. However, the management of Caldwell County is not interested in even researching this idea.

Ms. Pinson, I stand ready to share with you or with Caldwell County representatives any additional background data and audits that I have which supports the rate increase for which we are asking. I hope that the information I am providing will be sufficient for the Public Service Commission to approve the rate increase as presented. Should you require any additional information, please feel free to contact me.

Dear Jimmy;

As promised from our meeting earlier today, I wanted to give you the official notification of our planned rate increase. The (City of) Princeton Water and Wastewater Commission ("PW&W") plans to file a revised tariff with the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("PSC") on or about November 6, 2019. This filing will increase the PW&W wholesale water rate \$0.68 (29.7%) from the existing \$2.29 per 100 cubic feet to the new rate of \$2.97 per 100 cubic feet. When converting this rate to gallons, the new rate per 1,000 gallons would be \$3.97. This is the same rate currently being paid by all city residents of PW&W once they reach a threshold of 2,000 cubic feet.

Our board has already passed the first reading of this regulation and plans to have the second reading at the upcoming meeting scheduled November 5, 2019. The rate increase will be effective for water used beginning January 1, 2020 and billed during the February 2020 billing cycle. Once completed, this filing may be examined at the PW&W offices located at 101 East Market Street in Princeton, Kentucky. This filing may also be examined at the offices of the Kentucky Public Service Commission located at 211 Sower Boulevard in Frankfort, Kentucky, Monday – Friday from 8:00 am – 4:30 pm or on the PSC website at http://psc.ky.gov. CITY OF PRINCETON, KENTUCKY WATER AND WASTEWATER COMMISSION REGULATION NO. 07-02-2019

A REGULATION ESTABLISHING A NEW WHOLESALE WATER RATE TO BE CHARGED BY THE WATER AND WASTEWATER COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PRINCETON, KENTUCKY FOR THE PUBLIC AND PRIVATE USE OF THE MUNICIPAL WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2020 AND BILLED FEBRUARY 2020

WHEREAS, by ordinance No. 2-21-83 (4), the City Council of the City of Princeton granted the City of Princeton Water and Wastewater Commission (hereafter "Commission") the authority to determine programs and make all plans and determinations as to improvements, rates, and financial practices, and to establish such rules and regulations as it deems necessary or appropriate to govern the furnishing of water and sewer services on behalf of the City of Princeton; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has conducted an evaluation of water rates required to provide adequate revenue to meet actual operation, maintenance, and replacement costs attributable to the system, to meet obligated indebtedness costs, and payments required by applicable bonds and other financial obligations; and

WHEREAS, the Commission continues to incur increases in electricity charges, state mandated retirement and pension funding increases, increased chemical costs and flushing costs associated with meeting numerous federal regulations, and decreased sales as households and industry have become more efficient and conservative; and

WHEREAS, in order to establish a more fair and equitable rate system and to be able to continue providing our customers with quality water both now and in the future and in order to recoup the actual costs incurred to produce and distribute services; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the aforementioned rate analysis, water and sewer rate schedules have been prepared consistent with applicable Kentucky Division of Water requirements and policies;

WHEREFORE, the Princeton Water and Wastewater Commission hereby adopts the following regulation:

Section 1. The billing and rates for water service to the customers connected to the Commission's water system within the corporate limits of the City of Princeton shall remain unchanged and continue as adopted at the June 7, 2019 meeting. The rates are as follows:

First 175 cubic ft. / month (min bill): \$8.60

Next 1,825 cubic ft. / month \$ 3.36 / 100 CF Over 2,000 cubic ft. / month \$ 2.97 / 100 CF

Section 2. The billing and rates for water service to customers connected to the Commission's water system outside the corporate limits of the City of Princeton shall remain unchanged.

Section 3. Monthly rates for water service to wholesale customers of the Commission (other municipalities or rural water districts which take delivery at master water meters) shall be increased to the level now being charged the Commission's largest customers.

FLAT RATE – NO TIERS

\$ 2.97 / 100 CF

The Commission also proposes a surcharge to recover all expenses it may incur to participate in and defend its proposed rates in any Public Service Commission proceeding that is initiated to investigate the reasonableness of those rates. PWWC proposes to recover the total amount of expenses associated with the increase in rates over a 36-month period from the party(ies) that initiates the investigation. If no proceeding is established, PWWC will not seek to recover any amount for Rate Case Expense Surcharge. The estimated cost of the rate case expenses is \$99,000; therefore, PWWC would seek to collect \$2,750 per month in total.

Section 4. Monthly rates for sewer service to customers connected to the Commission's sewer system within the corporate limits of the City of Princeton shall remain at a flat rate of \$7.24 per 100 cubic feet. The structure, as adopted at the June 7, 2019 meeting is as follows:

First

150 cubic ft. / month (min bill):

\$ 10.86

Over

150 cubic ft

\$ 7.24 / 100 CF

Section 5. All customers connected to either the water and sewer system will continue to be charged a monthly customer service fee of \$6.00 per month per meter whether connected to one or both systems.

Section 6. Any regulation or portion thereof inconsistent with the terms of this Regulation is hereby repealed and any section of this Regulation adjudged invalid or unconstitutional shall not affect the validity of the Regulation as a whole or any other section or provision hereof.

Section 7. The change in the wholesale rates provided for herein shall become effective upon its adoption, approval and publication as provided by law with usage starting January 1, 2020 and billed in the February 2020 billing cycle.



In the 1980s, the population of Princeton was 13.4% higher and the retail base of downtown was thriving as was the industrial sector (Grinnell, Federal Mogul, Arvin Industries, Princeton Hosiery Mills, the shirt factory etc.). Declining or decreasing block rate structures were popular as a tool for small cities to use to attract industry and also were appropriate for utilities operating at or near capacity where economies of scale could be realized. Rates were left untouched through the 1990s until 2000, when the plant and tank capacities were expanded to allow for growth within Caldwell and Lyon County customer bases. Afterwards, PWWC found itself with a much higher debt load, increasing expenditures, and decreasing usage and revenues due to declining population, industry and the loss of the City of Eddyville. Rather than place the burden on those for whom the system improvements benefited, a 40% across the board increase was implemented. Residential customers saw an increase of \$1.14/100 cft while the largest users only increased \$0.34 (\$0.30 for wholesale). Those who drove the need for additional capacity, were now paying only 27% of what the smaller residential customer was paying. Similar across the board increases have followed with the gap between the lowest tiers and highest tiers now widening to \$3.44.


Since October 2019, the Commission has been working with the University of North Carolina Environmental Finance Center to perform financial, affordability and rate studies. From a financial perspective, all of the ratios were favorable with the exception of age of assets where data indicated that > 56% of our fixed assets were fully depreciated. Regarding affordability, data indicates that we have a vulnerable population with 39.4% on Social Security; 20.2% of people having income below the poverty level; and 17.8% of citizens receiving food stamp/SNAP benefits. All of these measurements were worse than the state and national averages and should be considered with any future rate increases. After reviewing the billing information, it became apparent that the smaller users were subsidizing the larger users and the residential user can no longer be expected to shoulder the burden of maintaining a system where the largest users pay the least amount for the product.

Audits and departmental data were analyzed to determine fixed versus volumetric charges and reviews were made of the base rate charges and the rate structure itself. The conclusion was made that most of the costs incurred to treat the water are fixed with very few charges being variable or tied to volumes. After reviewing the billing information, it became apparent that the smaller users were subsizing the larger users (a hallmark of a declining block rate system). Costs to treat and distribute clean water continue to rise due to many external factors that are out of control of the Commission. Steps have been taken to bid services, eliminate redundancy in the processes, streamline processes and implement technology to take the place of labor, and basically "think out of the box". The conclusion was made that the declining block rate structure was no longer a good fit for Princeton. Full cost pricing is simple, fair and equitable and promotes conservation.

Based on 6/30/19 data, the cost to produce water while providing adequate debt service and reserves for the future is \$3.76 per 100 cuft when considering a water loss ratio of 15%. With no water loss the cost declines to \$3.20 per 100 cuft.

PWWC proposes to recover the total amount of expenses associated with the increase in rates over a 36-month period from the party(ies) that initiates the investigation. If no proceeding is established, PWWC will not seek to recover any amount for Rate Case Expense Surcharge. The estimated cost of the rate case expenses is \$99,000; therefore, PWWC would seek to collect \$2,750 per month in total.

These rates/fees were approved by the City of Princeton Water and Sewer Commission in Regulation No. 07-02-2019, given first reading on July 2, 2019 and given second reading and passed on November 5, 2019 per authority granted by the City Council of the City of Princeton by Ordinance No. 2-21-83 (4).
