To Whom it May Concern:

I am very concerned about the hardship the new rate increases will create for our citizens that rely strictly on an SSI check for income. For example, I know a young woman who was seriously injured in a car accident years ago that left her with a physical disability. She has been receiving SSI benefits ever since. She currently receives \$783.00 in monthly benefits and \$135 in food stamps. Her basic monthly expenses are as follows:

Total	\$589.54
Phone & Internet	55.00
Wastewater/sewer	14.30
Water	20.24
Electricity	100.00 (avg)
Rent	\$400

With these basic expenses, she is left with around \$190.00 for clothes, cigarettes, personal hygiene supplies, eating out on occasion, household goods like trash bags, paper towels, toilet paper...I am sure you get the idea.

Every dollar counts.

I only use her as an example. There are many more citizens in my county that are living under similar circumstances.

A higher rate for water in Leslie County may likely mean a higher rate for our wastewater service too because the amount of water used determines the wastewater rate.

I am not writing to complain about the increase in the rate, but that the system of having a minimum bill is especially unfair to low-income citizens that use less than 2,000 gallons per month.

But is this system fair to any resident, low-income or otherwise?

Rather than basing the rate on the actual usage, the first 2,000 gallons has a set fee of 20.24. Therefore, if a resident uses only 1,000 gallons, they must pay the same as someone that used 2,000 gallons. \$1.00 per gallon **up to** 2,000 gallons, not **the first** 2,000 gallons, would be fair.

If the new rates are approved, I submit that residents be charged for only the number of gallons used **up to 2,000**. This would calculate somewhere around \$1.72 per gallon.
