My wife and I live in our 30 year old home in Crestwood, Oldham Co., Kentucky. On approximately January 10, 2021 we received our LG&E bill. Included in the mailing was a notice that LG&E had filed a rate increase request with the Public Service Commission on November 25, 2020 to become effective on or after January 1, 2021. We're not sure why we received the notice almost two months after it was filed with PSC but we assume that PSC has not reviewed or issued a ruling on this request at the present time. If that is the case we wish to serve notice of our opposition to this filing. Our opposition is based on both the frequency of the filings in the past 20 years, and the magnitude of the proposed increase of this particular filing.

By our count this is the tenth filing by LG&E in the past 20 years, and the fifth in the past 5 years. One can't help but wonder why the financial management of this company doesn't appear to be better able to manage its income and expenses.

Our main concern, however, is the magnitude of the proposed rate increase, 11.8% for a residential home. We receive approximately 70% of our annual income from our Social Security checks. Attached are copies of the recent notices my wife and I received from Social Security announcing a generous 1.3 % increase in our payments for 2021. And a portion of that is being applied to the increase in our Medicare Part B premium payments!

We built a nice comfortable home here 30 years ago using a number of energy saving additions that we were familiar with in Minnesota. As a result our house compares favorably with similar homes in our area with regard to energy use. While I have not had a chance to review all elements of the proposed increase, unless it can produce efficiencies that these previous proposals appear to have fallen short on, in our opinion it would be hard to justify an increase half that size.
