I am writing to protect the current Net Metering compensation rate. I am about to invest in solar for my own home and I am personally affected. There are a few reasons why that now is not the time to make changes to the Net Metering compensation rate.

If the Public Service Commission decides to remove the protection of my rights to own solar and take away my choices and right to control my energy bills through an investment in solar, it is incumbent upon the Commission to have a compelling reason to do so. There is not nearly enough emphasis on energy efficiency and education ... many poor folks have no idea that the little space heaters they run 24-7 are what is running up their electric bill. They need a good public education on energy efficiency program, not a rate hike.

The PSC must devote more public spending towards energy efficiency and education, solar and wind on the mountains, Grant's for efficient lighting and energy star appliances and so on.

There is much work that can be done to help poor folks stay warm this winter and most is low hanging fruit. I have seen it so many times myself in the mountain communities.

Dear Public Service Commission.

Please do not allow Kentucky Power's rate adjustment plan to come to hearing.

This is not the time to make any changes in the net metering rates. The cost shifting claimed by utilities from home solar producers is unsupported and the number of home solar producers needs to actually grow to help achieve appropriate levels of non-carbon based energy production.

The current 1:1 ratio for net metering is totally appropriate and vital to help rooftop solar and the jobs it provides flourish. The rooftop systems allow the utilities to avoid overload at peak times and allows them to refrain from capital investments (overhead), the cost of which will be passed on the the consumer. Rooftop solar helps utilities and it needs to be a two way street.

If the Utilities are granted a change in the ratio, it will likely not be in favor of the public

(especially if proposed by the utility). It would only serve to provide more cash for the utilities and push the monopoly for clean energy production further away from local user, businesses and non-profits who are trying to do good things for the environment and lower their costs to provide more services for their customers and the general public.

The jobs and economic impact of roof top solar should be encouraged and a change in the current 1:1 net metering rate will only discourage end users from investing in solar systems.

Please protect our rights to use and develop solar. I do not want to see the industry stifled because rates are being manipulated in an anti-competitive manner.

Do not change net metering policies until you have completed a fair, independent, assessment of costs and benefits of net-metered, rooftop solar.

Please do not change the net metering rules for any utilities in KY. I am in the LGE-KU service area and the claims that the utility companies are making are unfounded. The claim that home solar owners are shifting the financial load to non solar customers is a joke. LGE-KU changed its billing to put the administrative costs into its meter fees which everyone pays. If i use 0 kWh of electricity in a month is still pay \$45.00 (for two meters) in meter fees . And that is after i even returned electricity to the grid during peak hours. So please help me understand how i am not paying my fair share.

While I am satisfied with the 1 to 1 credit that i am currently receiving, I still do not think it is completely fair. We return electricity to the grid during peak hours. If we do use any from the grid it

is during off peak hours. We are not compensated at peak demand prices and we help reduce LGE-KU's load. They are getting paid peak demand prices from other customers for electricity that they get from home solar owners and they only pay back at the off peak price. There has to be some value in that. So they are still coming out ahead.

I have contacted them in the past and asked them to add line items in their billing for complete transparency if anything i have said is not fact but never received a response.

Dear PSC members,

I am a retired engineer living in Oldham County Kentucky. In 2012 I invested \$18,000 in a rooftop solar array for my home. I did this to reduce my energy costs but also to lower the amount of coal that LG&E needed to burn to provide electricity to the grid. My system reaches peak output in the afternoons during the summer. This is when I am putting the greatest amount of my energy back into the grid. This is also the same time LG&E needs maximum power for the grid. This benefits both LG&E and the environment. With a small percentage of its customers augmenting power via solar during peak LG&E demand, LG&E can avoid building plants just to meet the top peak of its demand curve or supplementing its standard power output with more expensive gas turbines generators.

Look at the data and listen to the experts about the benefits of rooftop solar to both

our environment as well as the power companies. Don't listen to the power company's vague claims about the negative impact of rooftop solar unless they present clear and complete data to back up their claims. State after state has rejected bogus claims by power companies that want to end 1:1 net-metering in order to extract more profits and preserve their monopolies. Don't let Kentucky be the first state to fall for their lies and end 1:1 net-metering. 1:1 net-metering is good for Kentucky, good for the consumers, and imposes no undue burden on the power companies.

I am writing to share my opinion regarding PSC case 2020-00174. First off, I would say that with the economic uncertainties brought about by the COVID pandemic, it is a very bad time to be considering any changes to electric rates, ESPECIALLY changes that would impact rooftop "net-metered" solar installations.

The small-scale rooftop solar-energy market in Kentucky (and most of the USA, actually) is BOOMING, giving much-needed well-paying jobs to Kentuckians AND, with net-metering laws as they have been for the past 10 years, providing economically feasible "payoff" times for the consumers and small businesses that take the initiative to invest in their own energy-production system (i.e. rooftop solar). I personally own rooftop solar installations, but I likely would not have been able to afford them if net-metering laws had been different from what they have been for the past 10 years.

Kentucky Power's plan is NOT well-informed about the overall value of the "excess" energy fed back onto the grid by rooftop solar installations...and also, they neglect to mention the

benefits they receive from having power fed back onto their grid at times of "peak draw". It is quite understandable that they do this, and highly likely that they do this knowingly, because they are of course a utility company and they want to sell energy, make money, and "control the market". My view, however, is that any consumer or small business who has the wherewithal to install their own clean-energy-production system should be rewarded (not penalized) for their investment with either a "net" (1:1) buy/sell rate (or close to it).

Kentucky is woefully behind the times with clean energy investment and production, but if some KY consumers and small businesses are willing to step up and make the investment, they should be encouraged. I urge you to deny Kentucky Power's requests, and keep Rooftop Solar Net Metering the way it has been for the last 10 years. Don't make Kentucky fall behind any further than we are already!!

I write today to urge the PSC to reject Kentucky Power's proposed plan/request to eliminate the net metering arrangement adopted/preserved by 2019's legislative decision.



Dear Sir/Madam:

This is to formally submit a comment on this case from Kentucky Power.

There is no proof that warrants a change in 1-for-1 net metering. They have submitted no evidence of their own data experience that supports their case. Instead, they rely on data from other utilities. They cite data from 44 customers; that is not adequate. It is clear that this utility company seeks to control our ability to own our own solar systems. I have a solar system on my home and this is a dangerous and unfair precedent that will cause the roof top industry to suffer in Kentucky, and that would in turn mean that fewer Kws are put into the grid from this clean energy source.

The proposal also ignores a key point: the fact that distributed solar provides to both the utilities and ratepayers. There is a direct correlation between solar peak production and peak energy demand, reduced line loss and wear and tear on the grid, avoided expenditures on pollution controls, health and environmental benefits. The avoided-cost rate does not account for these obvious benefits.

This proposal sets a terrible precedent in Kentucky, and I urge the Commission to deny it.
