I am a KU customer. I am very much interested in getting my electricity from renewable sources. So interested, in fact, that I pay an extra fee so that KU will source a fixed amount for me. However, there are a few injustices in the way that this works.

Attached to each monthly bill is a fuel adjustment. I try to buy enough renewable to cover all of my usage. So if my electricity is coming from wind and solar and hydro, why must I pay a fuel adjustment? It really doesn't seem fair. My understanding is that these adjustments are to handle the variable costs associated with coal and gas, that I am paying not to use.

Also, there are environmental mitigation costs built into my bill. Again, if I am getting renewable energy, why am I paying for pollution mitigation that I'm not generating? It doesn't seem fair.

My preference would be for all KU's generation to be from renewable sources. Obviously I am willing to pay a little extra to make it happen. And even with these unjust fees remain, I want this renewable option to continue as long as the default sources are fossil fuels. Please don't let them discontinue the program until such time as it is unnecessary. However, the program could be tweaked to make it more fair.

And, by the way, the IRP needs to contain a plan to phase out the use of fossil fuels entirely by 2040.

Integrated Resource Plan: LG&E/KU

The people of Louisville are thankful that LG&E has a business plan to maintain good service in the future as it has in the past.

But many of us are here today because of an emergency, a slow emergency that is rapidly picking up speed. Carbon dioxide concentrations in the atmosphere were steady for 10,000 years but began rising with the burning of coal, oil, and natural gas. The air we are breathing right now contains 50% more CO₂. The last time carbon was this high was 3 ½ million years ago, when sea levels were 78 feet higher, and temperatures were 7 degrees hotter. Last year, 40 billion more tons of CO₂ were dumped into the air and this year we will dump 41 billion tons more. CO₂ is increasing and the rate of increase is increasing. LG&E's

business plan is part of the emergency.

The city of Louisville passed a resolution for 100% renewable energy by 2040. LG&E has ignored the will of its customers and the will of its host city in this business plan. We demand that they rethink what they are doing. if they do not, we, the people of Louisville and of Kentucky generally, should find another provider of our electricity.

Dear Members of the Public Services Commission:

I have signed up to offer comment by Zoom at tomorrow's hearing on the KY proposed Integrated Resources Plan. I am scheduled to be at a doctor's appointment during the portion at which public comment is scheduled (9-10AM), so it is possible I may not be free to participate when my turn comes. Therefore, I am submitting these written comments, which I hope can be read aloud or taken into consideration.

COMMENTS

WHO I AM: I am a lifelong resident of Kentucky, who has always received my electricity through KU. In the course of my career, I have also worked with many low-income residents of Kentucky who live in energy inefficient dwellings, and experience financial hardship due to higher utility costs.

CONCERNS ABOUT THE PROPOSED IRP:

1. Evidence of Climate Change and its economic impact are increasingly apparent around our country and around the world. Extreme wildfires are now a regular presence in the West, as are severe droughts and heat waves. Major lakes which supply water to large communities are drying up, including Lake Powell and the Great Salt Lake. The previous two years have seen multiple billion dollar climate disasters across the US, along with less costly but still expensive disasters in Kentucky. This summer, 1/3 of our state has been affected by drought, with the corn crop and soybean crop now at risk. It is now clear that Climate Change will be a hard-hitting force that will affect all of us. This means our state, and our utility company, should be adopting a fast track for all possible preventive measures, including a transition to renewable energy, promotion of stringent energy efficiency programs, and the closing of coal-fired plants. If we continue to burn fossil fuels, the GHG emissions will put us on track to blow past the 1.5 degree warming threshold that would support our ongoing survival with some degree of quality of life. When I read about the water shortages that are consequences of Climate Change, I fear for the future of my daughter and her children.
2. Addressing Climate Change is a Moral Obligation: The lawyers for KU have stated that the company is providing the cheapest option for electricity with coal-fired plants, and that it is under no obligation to consider Climate Change. I say that fossil fuel energy is in no way "cheap" if past and present Climate disasters are added to the equation. I also say that the costs of continuing to burn fossil fuels will be beyond our imagination. Responding to Climate Change

is a moral obligation for every company on the planet, including KU. I request that the IRP be revised to reflect a Climate-informed plan.
