MOTION FOR APPROVAL TO DEVIATE FROM RULES AND NOTICE OF FILING OF PUBLICATION OF PUBLIC NOTICE

Kentucky American Water ("KAW") moves the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("Commission") to grant KAW approval, pursuant to 807 KAR 5:001, Section 22 and 807 KAR 5:011, Section 15, to deviate from the notice requirements in the above-captioned proceeding because KAW has substantially complied with the Commission's notice regulations. In support of this motion, KAW states as follows:

- 1. On March 1, 2021, KAW gave notice to the Commission of the need to revise the amount of the Kentucky River Authority Fee that is a line item on KAW customer bills. The requested revision was a decrease and a proposed tariff sheet reflecting that decrease was submitted.
- 2. On March 30, 2021, the Commission approved the proposed revision and the new amount became effective on March 31, 2021.
- 3. On February 19, 2021, KAW delivered to the Kentucky Press Service, Inc. ("Kentucky Press"), an organization that acts on behalf of newspapers of general circulation throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky in which customers affected reside, for publication therein once a week for three consecutive weeks beginning no later than March 1, 2021, a notice to customers of the requested decrease in the 14 newspapers located within KAW's service

territory. A listing of those newspapers, a Kentucky Press affidavit, and the proof of publication in those newspapers is attached.

- 4. KAW requests a deviation because, although 13 of the 14 newspapers ran the notice at least one time prior to KAW's March 1, 2021 filing with the Commission, one newspaper, the *McKee Jackson County Sun*, did not run the first notice until March 10, 2021. This newspaper did publish the notice three times, but the first publication was delayed due to an inadvertent error by Kentucky Press. As soon as the error was realized, Kentucky Press rectified it by making sure the first notice ran no later than March 10, 2021 and that the notice ran a total of three times. The newspaper with the largest circulation in KAW's service territory, the *Lexington Herald-Leader*, published the notice correctly for three consecutive weeks beginning on February 24, 2021.
- 5. The purpose of the Commission's notice regulation is to ensure that the public has sufficient notice of KAW's requested fee revision and to respond accordingly. Despite the deviation noted above, notice was published in each county three times, and that notice was further supplemented by posting at KAW's offices and on KAW's website. KAW's substantial compliance with the Commission's regulations has met the purpose of the notice requirement. As stated by the Kentucky Supreme Court:

Substantial compliance in regard to publication requirements has been authorized The purpose of the statute is to allow the public an ample opportunity to become sufficiently informed on the public question involved. ¹

6. The Commission has authority to permit KAW to deviate from the publication requirements pursuant to 807 KAR 5:001, Section 22 and 807 KAR 5:011, Section 15.

¹ Conrad v. Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, 659 S.W.2d 190, 195 (Ky. 1983) (citing Queenan v. City of Louisville, 233 S.W.2d 1010 (Ky. 1950)). See also Lyon v. County of Warren, 325 S.W.2d 302 (Ky. 1959) (publishing notice of bond referendum outside statutory time limits, accompanied by media attention and other means, held sufficient notice to public).

7. Because KAW is in substantial compliance with the publication requirements of 807 KAR 5:001, Section 17(2) and 807 KAR 5:011, Section 8(2), good cause exists for the Commission to permit KAW to deviate from the requirement of the regulations and to accept the publication of notice of KAW requested fee decrease as sufficient.

WHEREFORE, KAW respectfully requests that the Commission grant it approval pursuant to 807 KAR 5:001, Section 22 and 807 KAR 5:011, Section 15 to deviate from the notice requirements of 807 KAR 5:001, Section 17(2) and 807 KAR 5:011, Section 8(2) and to accept the publication described above as sufficient.

"Not all who wander are lost. Sometimes we are just looking for stones.

I've been hunting the ancient hunters of northeast Kentucky for a pretty good while and I very much enjoy walking across our ancient landscape searching for evidence of the Native Americans who once lived here.

The untrained eye would never identify some of the subtle terrain features or discoloration that exposed ground can provide for those of us who recognize such things and which are a clear indication of primitive occupancy.

I quit wondering a long time ago why I am attracted to such things and just 'go with it' now.

I've always liked the outdoors and history, so I combine the two, along with a healthy dose of identifying physical evidence left by those who came before me.

Thousands of fascinat-

ing people once inhabited this place we call home. The Native American nomads wandered across northeast Kentucky almost ten thousand years ago and they left physical evidence in the form of artifacts everywhere they traveled.

Hundreds of genera-

tions of Native people came afterward and occupied the same region in villages, large and small; also leaving evidence of their existence in the form of stone tools and artifacts. Artifacts made of bone, shell and antler, also litter the landscape, sometimes just neath the surface of the ground, but they become exposed by farm equipment. Once exposed they are susceptible to becoming broken by additional farm equipment and I've picked up tons of broken artifacts; It's heartbreaking; but I'm still amazed at the electrical surge that seems to go through me when I hold any ancient artifact in my hand. My son Cassidy enjoys the woods,

found a few interesting artifacts, including a broken projectile point,

streams and artifact and fossil hunting. His mother, Amber and I, take him artifact hunting on a regular basis and every once in a while, it's just us two guys: father and

One of the last times Cassidy and I went artifact hunting, searched a low-lying ridge that had produced some interesting artifacts and I promised him that any stone or object he liked and wanted to keep, I would carry it for him in my relic bag. So it's about 200 yards of difficult walking to get into the field and the field is huge and I know we will be there a while, looking for an hour or so at least, and just as soon as we get to the first little elevation in the field he says, "Daddy, I want you to keep this for me."

I look down and he's pointing to what looks like a huge broken brick. He insists I pick it up and after a brief discussion I do, just as he wishes and just as I promised, even though the thing is huge and heavy and we have no shortage of broken bricks at home, but... what are you going to do? A promise is a promise.

Well, we hunted for

and we went home and cleaned up our finds.

THE RIDDLES OF THE STONES

Turns out, the 'broken brick' is actually a huge camp mortar stone that has tons of character and has lots of native marks on it. It has so much human patina from constant use and handling, it actually shines!

It's one of our prized artifacts now and whenever Cassidy tells me to pick up a stone from the field, I just do it!

The frozen tundra-like landscape of the past month has put a serious damper on our relic hunting, but when relic fever burns bright in me; I go through my boxes of old and broken relics and examine them.

The other night I refound an artifact which collectors commonly refer to as a "paint pot". It's a small hollowed stone from a village site that shows human usage. Well, I noticed the paint pot still had a little bit of dirt covering it all over and I got my handydandy, old, soft-bristle toothbrush (they are awesome to safely clean artifacts with) and began to scrub. After the stone had dried, I was thrilled

What Is Today's Date?

Take a bow Pope Gregory! Thanks to Pope Gregory XIII we have the calendar we use today which was introduced on February 24, 1582. The Gregorian Calendar is the most widely used calendar in the world today. It is the calendar used in the international standard for Representation of dates and times. It is a solar calendar based on a 365-day common year divided into 12 months of irregular lengths. 11 of the months have either 30 or 31 days, while the second month, February, has only 28 days during the common year.

The days of the year in the Gregorian calendar are divided into 7-day weeks, and the weeks are numbered 1 to 52 or 53. The international standard is to start the week on Monday. However, several countries including the US and Canada, count Sunday as the first

day of the week. Nearly every four years is a leap year, when one extra - or intercalary day, is added on 29 February, making the leap year in the Gregorian calendar 366 days long.

Prior to the Gregorian calendar, the Julian calendar was the accepted time recorder. The Julian calendar, proposed by Julius Caesar in AUC 708 (46 BC), was a reform of the Roman calendar. It took effect on 1 January AUC 709 (45 BC), by edict. It was designed with the aid of Greek mathematicians and astronomers such as Sosigenes of Alexandria. The Julian calendar's formula to calculate leap years produced a leap year every four years. This is too often, and eventually, the Julian calendar was several days out of sync with the fixed dates for astronomical events like

The introduction of the Gregorian calendar allowed for the realignment with events like the vernal equinox and winter solstice.

The original Roman calendar is believed to have been an observational lunar calendar whose months began from the first signs of a new crescent moon. Because a lunar cycle is about 29 1/2 days long, such months would have varied between 29 and

Another calendar that may be referenced in some parts of the world is known as the Chinese calendar. The traditional Chinese calendar is a lunisolar calendar which reckons years, months, and days according to astronomical phenomena.

ment of the Kentucky River Authority withdrawal fee. The fees contained in this notice are the fees to be proposed by Kentucky-American Water Company to the Public Service Commission no later than March 1, 2021 to be effective on March 31, 2021. The current fee, which applies to Residential Commercial, Industrial, Other Public Authority and Sales for Resale customers, is \$0.0292 per 100 gallons. The requested fee, which applies to the same customer classes as the current fee, is \$0.0290 per 100 gallons. For all customer classes to which the fee applies, the requested fee is a decrease of \$0.0002, or -0.68%, per 100 gallons. Average usage, in hundreds of gallons, for each customer class to which the fee applies is: Residential: 39; Commercial: 342; Industrial: 9,713; Other Public Authority: 1,205; and Sales for Resale: 18,720. The effect on the average monthly bill for each customer class to which the decreased fee applies is: Residential: \$0.01; Commercial: -\$0.07; Industrial: -\$1.94; Other Public Authority: -\$0.24 and Sales for Resale: -\$3.74. Customers in Eastern Rockcastle County are not charged the fee, therefore are excluded from the calculation. Any person may examine this tariff filing at Kentucky-American Water Company's offices located at 2300 Richmond Road, Lexington, Kentucky 40502, and on the utility's website at http://www.amwater.com/kyaw/. This filing may also be examined at the Public Service Commission's offices located at 211 Sower Boulevard, Frankfort, Kentucky, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., or through the Commission's website at http://psc.ky.gov. Comments regarding this filing may be submitted to the Public Service Commission through its website or by mail to Public Service Commission, P.O. Box 615, Frankfort, Kentucky 40602. Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

The cold February rain stung George Stockton's tattooed face, but he was oblivious to it.

He cradled the bloodcovered hound dog just as he had his 15-yearold, first-born-son Robert earlier that miserable

They buried Robert near the small stream gentle meadow, near the very spot where Shawnee warriors had taken his life.

He had never felt such despair and he was a man who had struggled with mental turmoil and despair his entire life.

Captured by Native American members of the Seneca Tribe and raised by a widowed Seneca clan widow, when he was a child of nine years of age, George Stockton grew into adulthood, first as a child slave and later as a venerated Seneca warrior.

As a young adult, he became fluent in several Native languages and various dialects of the tribes and clans around Niagara Falls.

He was later employed as an interpreter for a French trader at Detroit because of his knowledge of languages and terrain from Detroit to Montreal. Shortly after this he

yearned to see his natural white parents and returned to Virginia where he was embraced as a family member back from the dead.

Still later, he served as

a crafty, forage-master, during the Revolutionary War.

Major George Stockton was indeed a complex

A beautiful Maryland debutante, Rachel Dorsey, caught his eye a few years before the Revolutionary War. They fell in love and married in September 1772.

Their first born, Robert, was born the next

Rachel was pregnant with their third child, George Junior, when the Major came to Kentucky in 1776, to make improvements and build cabins, as part of the claim-staking and landacquisition process practiced at that time.

He brought his family with him on one of his frequent visits in 1787, and they moved into his wilderness fortress, Stockton's Station (present day Flemingsburg), after an extended stay with his friend, Simon Kenton, at Kenton's Station, near Washington, Mason County.

And not long after moving into his wilderness fortress, Robert had been killed.

They found Robert's body just where his Beechum companion, Rhodes, said he had last seen it.

Rhodes had been wounded in the thigh during the same nightattack that killed Robert Stockton. With no horse,

and being unable to walk, he began crawling the long 16 miles back to Stockton's Station.

Samuel Reed, had found the unconscious body of Beechum near wilderness Stockton's fortress and carried him back to the fortress gates. The first indication of

trouble for many of them came when they heard the blast of the conch shell blown by Aunt Ruby, an elder female servant of the Stockton family.

It was the standard alarm signal and was meant to let all in hearing distance know trouble was about and they should come immediately to the fort. The two young men, re-

ally not much more than teenage boys, had ridden out of Stockton Station almost two weeks earlier with two of the Major's fine hunting dogs. After establishing a

base camp, near present-day Belle Grove, in eastern Fleming County, they had a successful hunt. That night they were

attacked in their sleep by two, perhaps three, Shawnee warriors who their muskets into the sleeping pair of young frontiersmen.

Robert Stockton was killed instantly. Rhodes was struck twice in the thigh but dove into a nearby stream and hid.

The Shawnee entered

the camp, eager to take evident to all that the to the scalps and other plunder, but the dogs attacked with such ferocity, that it drove them

Rhodes dragged himself into camp, he was half-frozen from his plunge into the stream and sought heat from the campfire, but one of the dogs was lying on Robert's body and was fiercely protecting him and would not allow Beechum to get close or even retrieve his musket.

And so Beechum Rhodes did the only thing someone half-frozen and miles from home with two heavy lead slugs in their thigh could do.

He began the painful, slow crawl back toward Stockton's Station.

In seven days crawled 15 miles, and was within one mile of the fort, but was too weak to attempt swimming Fleming Creek. Samuel Reed found him and carried him across the creek and to the station.

The next day, George Stockton led a group of men to the hallowed campsite, They found Robert

Stockton where he had fallen.

The faithful dog, still lay astride its master.

From the carcasses of wolves and smaller vermin lying in a circle around the boy's body, and the amount of blood and torn earth, it was

But few of the men paid particular notice to Jake's wrath and how Colonel Edwards finally, and mercifully, simply reached out and hugged the young man; The men and the two horses they sat astride looked like marble statues in the ancient and beautiful forest near the river's edge.

Though only 23-yearsold he was a hardened veteran of the border wars, having buried his father and his aunt and uncle in 1780 when the family had initially moved to Grant's Station and they had perished from Shawnee aggression.

Jake was a trusted companion of Colonel Daniel Boone and had been placed in command as the lead scout in October of 1780 when Boone and others had trailed a similar Shawnee raiding party that had killed Edward Boone, near Plum

Those raiders had also

escaped. It was known that Jacob Stucker had killed many Native American warriors in the eight years since then, and he had led frontiersmen during raids when many more warriors had been killed.

He was a victim of too much sorrow, which had hardened him as a ruthless frontiersman wise beyond his years, but this experience had pushed him beyond his limits, just as it also had pushed his companions beyond their limits.

The evening prior there had been a strong knock at the double-log cabin of the Shanks family and a fluent English voice had inquired, "Who keeps the

WHISPERS AND BLOODLINES

Within a few moments, the small group of Shawnee warriors had made another successful hit and run raid into the communities around Grant's Station and had killed five members of the Shanks family along Cooper's Run.

It was believed that the same group of warriors had killed Michael Gillespie, only a few weeks earlier. Michael Gillispie and his wife Betsy Shanks Gillespie had just celebrated the birth of their first child the day he was killed.

Two of her sisters were killed at the house, along with their mother and a brother. One of the dead girls had killed a warrior with a loom knife, as he burst into the cabin. One girl had been taken captive and another, Susan Shanks, had hid in a hollow log as the cabin burned.

Only the widowed Betsy Shanks Gillespie and her little one-yearold baby, along with her brother Michael Shanks, had escaped the ning's violence.

The pursuit of the Shawnee raiders by the neighbors was immediate but led to the female prisoner being hawked because she was slowing the progress of the raiders' escape. Two suicide Shawnee back spies stayed behind to slow the progress of the approaching pioneers.

Both of the suicide Shawnee warriors had been killed, but they had

given their companions ample time to escape.

That had been a bitter pill to swallow for them all, but worse yet had been seeing young Michael Shanks, cradling his still-alive sister, as she lay scalped and dying near the river.

With failing breath she had whispered a final farewell to him and then she was gone.

The thought of those dying whispers had nearly driven Jacob Stucker and the rest of them crazy, having heard far too many similar whispers in the months and years

The dead girl was carried back to Cooper's Run and she and her four dead family members were buried near the ruins of the cabin in one common grave.

In January 1789 Susan Shanks, the sister who had hidden in the hollow log during the attack on the cabin, married William Rice and they moved to the small community of Sherburne in southern Fleming County along the Licking River where they raised a large family.

Descendants of her family, including Minnie Emmons Doyle, still live in Fleming County.

Jacob Stucker married Betsy Rogers in June of 1789. They would have 14 children together. Their bloodline, likewise, flows through the veins of many family members in northeastern Kentucky and across the nation.

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




My little heart warrior: A story of overcoming CHD

February is American Heart Month, and February 7-14 was Congenital Heart Defect Aware-

Congenital Heart Defects, or CHDs, are the most common and most lethal birth-defect, affecting about 1 in every 100 babies (The Children's Heart Foundation and The American Heart Association.) I used to not have to know this, and if we could write our own stories, I would remain unaware. But as much as I repeated that phrase "I don't care if it's a boy or a girl, as long as my baby is healthy," the fact is the health of our child is not something within our control. If we were in control, there would surely be no sick babies.

Weeks before the due date of my second child, a boy, I had been through over twice as many ultrasounds as I had with my first child. But while I had been a bundle of nerves with my daughter, I just didn't worry about this one. I knew that the doctors would tell me if I needed to worry; I thought they were being overly cautious and that my son wasn't being entirely photogenic and showing them what they were looking to see during these

Finally, we were referred to a cardiologist for a fetal echocardiogram. We still didn't learn the full truth, but it was the first time we were told in certain terms that something very likely was wrong. Jonas' heart was enlarged on one side. They suspected a coarctation, or narrowing of the aorta, but during the meeting in a cramped room with a cardiologist and a social worker, they laid out possibilities ranging from mild to tragic. It was in that meeting that I learned that my hopes for my child and reality were on divergent courses. I wept, but still had the mind frame to ask countless questions, last grasps to attempt to understand what I felt slipping through my fingers.

After that meeting, I went to a dark place. I felt like a happy pregnancy had been stolen from me. And to be honest, I felt entitled to that blissful pregnancy because of the months that bled into years of trying, because of

promises on a stick that had gone unfulfilled before. I pre-mourned the moments that I now feared were slipping away. Holding and nursing my newborn in those still moments right after birth was no longer a promise. It had been replaced with the possibility of an oxygen-deprived blue child and an army of doctors and medical equipment. Moments spent laying on the couch with my husband and daughters' eyes trained to my enormous swollen belly waiting for the floor show to begin were now tainted with a reality I wanted desperately to reject outright. But more importantly and

outside myself was this innocent, sinless life was now marred. Something wasn't just stolen from me, it was stolen from my unborn son. And an instinct swelled inside me. An instinct to gnash my teeth, pound my fists, and take back what was rightfully his, evaporated when faced with reality. My bubbling hostility and rage had no outlet, so it just turned to despair that welled up and slid down my cheeks, staining the neckline of so many maternity blouses. But as much as I wanted to bury myself beneath blankets and forego all attempts at hygiene, there were two-year-old wide eyes trained upon me. And I could only howl and truly fix my thoughts on the unknown enemy when my daughter was asleep or when my husband could watch her while I tried to stifle my sobs in the closet. I would plaster on a smile, splash water on my face, check the mirror to make sure it didn't look as crooked and meaningless as it felt.

was now assigned to me, and I wanted to throw it all back. My new gynecologist had kind eyes, but he had not delivered my daughter. He was not the tall. lanky calming woman who knew my struggles to conceive, who knew my family and my story. In hindsight, acceptance of these insignificant details would have been just as easy, but anger and resentment clouded my lens. There was no forest, only massive unmoving Sequoias, too big to even see around. So close. So enormous. And the clock un-

ceasingly ticked. There was no

I lost my obstetrician, my birth

plan, the act of choice- a hospital

way to take a break to gather my thoughts. There were moments, very early while still groggy, I would feel my swollen belly first before I remembered the omen now leeched onto to it. I would reremember the visit, the cardiologist's words, and then crumple back into the knowledge of what was coming.

Two weeks after our world was flipped on its head, I went into labor. This time the question of an epidural was nothing. I had hesitated with my daughter because I wanted to do what was best for her. But now, who cared? Nothing was scripted anymore. Bring on any form of relief available to me or to him. Instead of one or two nurses and a trusted doctor, there were teams of pimply faced Doogie Howsers at this teaching hospital, names forgotten as soon as they were born from their mouths.

The birth was frenetic, chaotic Monitors beeped ominously as they turned me in circles trying different positions. I focused all my energy into bringing him into this uncertain world. The whole thing was horrifically, beautifully choreographed, so many specialists and hands moving in such a tight space. Very quickly, he arrived, and the choreography swept him away to check his heart. People reported

to me how good he looked, and after doing tests and checks they brought him to me and I was able to hold him, a moment that had not been guaranteed but was welcome.

And even in a specialty hospital, with a specialty obstetrician, and a team of doctors and nurses I found myself hoping again. I think it's my condition to find the good in people and in moments, but that very nature is dangerous in situations like this. He wasn't blue or abnormally tiny. He was a miracle. I let the hope wash over me again, but sometimes all that hope does is set you up for the next blow to strike even harder.

Dr. LeFebvre is the cardiologist whose gardening our very brief birth interrupted. I remember feeling relieved when we went in to meet her — that the room was larger and there was no social worker. But then she drew a diagram of a heart on a white board. She explained that Jonas, indeed, did have a congenital heart disease. He had a coarctation of his aorta. She likened it to when you squeeze a water hose tightly so that only a tiny amount of water trickles out, only this was the apparatus through which your oxygenated blood would travel to the rest of your body. Among the new

acronyms we learned was VSD ventricle septum defect. He had a hole in his heart, in addition to his coarctation, possibly allowing the mingling of oxygenated blood with the deoxygenated

Jonas was given Prostaglandin, a medication that kept his ductus arteriosus from closing. I never knew about this blood vessel prior to Jonas, but I now know it is a blood vessel in fetuses that connects the pulmonary artery to the aorta because fetus's lungs are fluid-filled and nonfunctioning. This vessel is supposed to quickly close and be come a ligament after birth, but we needed it to remain open and help get oxygen rich blood to the rest of his body.

Jonas was rushed by ambulance to Cincinnati Children's Hospital with two very kind strangers we met just minutes before they were out the door with our newborn. How often do parents put all their faith in complete strangers during moments

At five days old, Jonas had open heart surgery. Dr. Theodore Bryant III, a man with the build of a professional football or basketball player, would use those enormous hands to open his chest to repair my son's heart. He and a team of doctors and nurses patched Jonas's VSD with bovine septum. They cut out the narrow part of his aorta, and sewed everything together. Dr. Bryant smiled afterwards as he referred to Jonas as "resilient" and "durable", and his words and demeanor made me trust him.

Our tiny minotaur cyborg began the process of getting better. His cow-tissue heart and machines that pumped hope day and night were both a punch to the guts, and a beautiful reminder of how far faith and med icine had taken our little guy.

In the end, the surgery, watching a newborn come off a morphine addiction, a month with a feeding tube, a gnarly scar, all things that I'd completely fixated on, mourning each as a loss of normalcy, none of it even mattered.

Jonas is not just a three-yearold. He's a three-year-old superhero with a prominent scar down the center of his chest and one hell of an origin story.

New Ordinance introduced, regulation of small wireless facilities/cell towers

CITY OF GEORGETOWN,

ORDINANCE NO. 2021-01 AN ORDINANCE ADDING A NEW SECTION TO ARTICLE II OF THE GEORGETOWN-SCOTT COUNTY ZONING OR-DINANCE REGARDING THE REGULATION OF SMALL WIRELESS FACILITIES AND SMALL CELL TOWERS.

SUMMARY

1. Provides for the regulation of Small Wireless Facilities and Small Cell Towers, states the purpose of the regulations, cites authority to enact the regulations, covers general terms for interpretation and application of the regulations and defines terms used throughout the regulations.

2. Establishes the option for a pre-application conference between the applicant and Georgetown-Scott County Planning and Zoning Staff ("Staff"),

as well as other interested parties such as utility providers, the owner of the right-of-way or property on which the infrastructure is proposed to be installed, etc.

3. Provides that, prior to application submittal, an applicant must obtain a franchise with the City of Georgetown, unless applicant already possesses a franchise from the City or the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

4. Outlines the items and information required for a complete Small Wireless Facility and/or Small Cell Tower Application to be accepted; establishes fee(s) for application

5. Establishes framework by which Staff and the Georgetown-Scott County Planning Commission ("Planning Commission") will process applications, outlines the location and

design regulations for proposed Small Wireless Facilities and Small Cell Towers and defines evaluation criteria for the approval or rejection of applica-

6. Defines the requirements for amending approved plans for Small Wireless Facilities and Small Cell Towers.

7. Provides for repeal of inconsistent ordinances, severability of provisions and an effective date upon passage and publica-

kicked off the season at home against the Red-Hawks (3-1) on a pleasant, 55-degree afternoon in front of a sparse, socially distanced crowd. Random piles of snow around the outskirts of the stadium were a reminder of the winter storm that crippled much of the country last

Ahead of the first pitch, a moment of silence was observed in honor of Ben Jordan, the former UK pitcher and basketball team member who died in January at age 22. Jordan's jersey, bearing No. 3, hung from a hook in the Kentucky dugout throughout the game.

"These guys have been through a lot," Mingione said. "They were like little kids today, they were down there early hitting and it was neat to see their excitement.'

The Wildcats could hardly have dreamed up a better start. Hagenow struck out the side on 12 pitches in the top of the first, flashing a fastball that ranged between 91 and 94 miles per hour. UK's offense wasted little time giving the freshman hurler cover.

Austin Schultz led off with a double up the middle. Fifth-year senior TJ

Collett blasted a moonshot home run to center field that hit the top of the wall and bounced out. Oraj Anu followed with a solo bomb, then Cam Hill sent a two-out shot over the left-center wall to give UK its third homer and a 4-0 lead after one inning.

Tuesday marked a triumphant return for Hill. The Scott County High School graduate appeared in just seven of UK's 17 games last season because of a broken wrist suffered while trying to make a play in the outfield. After junior-college transfer Alonzo Rubalcaba got his first hit as a Wildcat with a two-out double in the third inning, Hill followed with an RBI double to make it 5-0 Kentucky.

"He's had an awesome spring ... I was happy to see him carry that over right into the game," Mingione said.

Defense was a problem for the Cats the last two years and the staff worked hard to address that in the offseason, bringing in Rubalcaba to act as the main catcher and fellow juco transfer Ryan Ritter to start at shortstop. UK's defense was solid up the middle on Tuesday but

shakv elsewhere. Miami's first base run-

limited the damage thanks to a double play.

"Those were plays that we need to make ... That was disappointing, and that part's got to get better," Mingione said. "To me, those should be like layups. For us to be great

we've got to make those plays, and we've been making them. It was unfortunate, but obviously we'll get them corrected."

Biden: US will be able to vaccinate all adults by end of May

WASHINGTON

President Joe Biden said Tuesday that the U.S. expects to take delivery of enough coronavirus vaccines for all adult Americans by the end of May, two months earlier than anticipated, as his administration announced that drugmaker Merck & Co. will help produce rival Johnson & Johnson's newly approved shot.

The announcement comes as the White House looks to speed the production of the single-dose J&J vaccine and accelerate the nation's plans to reach "herd immunity" in the U.S. and begin restoring normalcy after the pandemic. Biden noted that vaccine supply was only one bottleneck toward that goal, and that the new challenge will be injecting doses into arms as swiftly as possible.

To that end, the Biden administration told governors Tuesday to prepare for their supplies of vaccine to continue to climb. Additional doses are also heading toward a federally backed program to administer doses in more accessible retail pharmacies.

Officials have said J&J faced unexpected production issues with its vaccine and produced only 3.9 million doses ahead of its receiving emergency use authorization on Saturday. The company has promised to deliver 100 million doses by the end of June.

White House press secretary Jen Psaki also an-

nounced Tuesday that the federal government was increasing supply of the Moderna and Pfizer vaccines to states next week

to 15.2 million doses per week, up from 14.5 million previously. States will also receive 2.8 million doses of the J&J shot this week.

On a call with governors Tuesday, White House coronavirus coordinator Jeff Zients said states should prepare for administering 16 million-17 million total weekly doses of Pfizer and Moderna vaccines by the end of March, climbing to 17 million-18 million weekly by early April. The supply of J&J doses to states, expected to dip after the initial shipment this week, will climb to 4 million-6 million weekly doses by the end of March and 5 million-6 million doses weekly through the end of

More than 800,000 doses of the J&J vaccine will also be distributed this week to pharmacies to administer in a separate federally-run program that also includes 2.4 million doses of the other two

shots. Both figures are expected to steadily increase, as the White House increasingly looks to the capacity of pharmacy chains like CVS and Walgreens to help speed the nation's mass vaccination campaign.

Facing questions about the company's slipping delivery schedule, J&J Vice President Richard Nettles told lawmakers on Capitol Hill last week that the company had faced "significant challenges" because of its "highly complex" manufacturing process.

The assistance from Merck was expected to help J&J meet its production commitments and expand supply even further, but the administration did not immediately provide specifics.

Psaki said that an "across the administration effort" was required to get the two historic rivals to work together on the vaccines, even though con-

versations between the two companies have been going on for months.

"There's a difference between conversations and it moving forward," she said.

It was not immediately clear when the effect of Merck's assistance would be reflected in supply. Previously, federal officials have cautioned that setting up the highly specialized manufacturing lines to produce vaccines would take months.

The White House said Merck would devote two plants to the production process. One would make the vaccine and the other would handle inserting the vaccine into vials and ensuring strict quality controls.

Psaki said the Biden administration was using its powers under the Defense Production Act to help Merck retool to work on the production.

Compared to the twodose versions produced by


Moderna and Pfizer, the J&J vaccine is less resource intensive to distribute and administer. The J&J vaccine can be stored for months at refrigerated temperatures, rather than frozen, and doesn't require patients to return for a second dose three or four weeks later.

J&J has set up a global production network that includes brewing bulk vaccine at its Janssen facility in the Netherlands, and with a company in the U.S., Emergent BioSolutions, and another in India, Biological E. Ltd. Other contract manufacturers are lined up to help with later steps, including putting the vaccine into vials, in the U.S., Italy, Spain and South Africa.

Merck said it was in talks to help other drug companies with vaccine production, but wouldn't say Tuesday whether other deals are imminent.

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Students applying to UK for next three years will not need to submit ACT, SAT scores

Students applying to the University of Kentucky will not need to submit a standardized test score for at least the next few years, extending a pandemic-related change meant to assist high school students who have faced test cancellations and general disruptions to their education.

After much debate Monday afternoon, members of the university's faculty senate voted to extend a pilot program for the university's test-optional policy — which is accompanied by ongoing analysis of how these students perform once they get to college. According to the approved proposal, students who are applying through the 2024-25 school year will not need to submit an ACT or SAT score with their application.

Previously the testoptional policy was only extended to students arriving on campus for the 2021-22 school year. But admissions officials at UK are looking to extend the test-optional pilot program to gain more data and examine whether the policy could one day be permanent.

Christine Harper, UK's chief enrollment officer, told the faculty senate that

the university would be gathering data on how a student's high school classes were taught due to the pandemic, as well as data on how those students perform once in college.

Merit-based scholarships can be earned with or without a test score, but certain selective majors or departments may require a test score or other prerequisites, university admissions information shows. Harper also said that at any time selective colleges within the university may also opt-out of the program.

Even before the pandemic, colleges and universities across the state

and country have been moving away from requiring applying students to submit standardized test scores. Transylvania University, for example, has been test-optional since 2016, while many state schools have made the shift during the pandemic. UK's initial move to the test-optional policy last fall was built on growing data that high school GPA is the best indicator of how well a student will perform once they get to college.

"We ran our data here at the University of Kentucky, and it paired very well with the national data — finding that GPA is a better indication of stu-

dent success and retention than test score," Harper said in a release last fall. "So, based on that, we felt very comfortable moving to a test-optional process."

Harper submitted the proposal to extend the test-optional policy and told the senate that approving sooner would help applying students and their high school college counselors plan for the future.

"By approving now, we will be able to announce our intentions early to prospective students, and in doing so will demonstrate UK's support for an accessible option for students dealing with a substantial number of external forces (access to testing, college going support, family financial strain) resulting from the pandemic," Harper wrote in the proposal. "Students who have a test score will still be considered, as well as those without test score, using data analysis and college input, this summer and fall.'

Some faculty senators expressed concern that the move to a longer term test-optional pilot was being pushed forward without enough feedback from the larger body of faculty. Two amendments to the proposal, including one that would have shortened the program by a year, were both voted down and the proposal passed with 52 voting in favor, one voting against and five abstentions.

Additionally, "Dead Week" — the last week of every semester prior to the all-important Finals Week will be renamed to "Prep Week," as faculty senators unanimously approved a measure to rename the week generally meant to give students time to prepare for their end-of-semester exams. The now-approved proposal was requested in honor of those who may have lost loved ones to suicide and to give a more accurate description for the week's purpose: prepping for finals.

Effort to set up civilian board for police oversight in Lexington faces roadblocks

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A state senator is pushing legislation that would let Lexington set up an independent board of civilians to investigate and review questionable actions taken by Lexington police

The measure filed by Sen. Reginald Thomas, D-Lexington, would give the police oversight board power to obtain a subpoena issued by a circuit court judge to compel the testimony of witnesses or the production of documents, books, papers, or

other records.

"This will be an uphill battle to get through the legislature this year but I am putting it out there," said Thomas in an interview Tuesday. "Frankly, there is a lot of push back in the Republican

Republicans outnumber Democrats 30-8 in the Senate and 75-25 in the House.

The lawmaker noted

that Senate Bill 247, sponsored by Senate Minority Leader Morgan McGarvey, D-Louisville, would also give direct subpoena power to Louisville's new civilian police review board.

"I have filed an amendment to that bill to include Lexington and make sure Lexington's board would have strong subpoena power, something with real teeth in it," he said, adding that McGarvey supports the amendment.

He said several people asked him to file the amendment

Thomas noted that Lexington Mayor Linda Gorton's Commission for Racial Justice and Equality last October recommended adding civilians to an officer disciplinary review committee, which currently consists of command staff and no civilians.

But to do so, changes would have to be made to the collective bargaining agreement with the Fraternal Order of Police.
Negotiations between the city and the FOP are ongoing.

Gorton created the racial justice commission in response to weeks of marches and protests in downtown Lexington in the wake of police-involved killings in 2020 of George Floyd in Minneapolis and Breonna Taylor in Louisville.

Kentucky — KRS 15.520 — sets guidelines for hearing complaints of misconduct against an officer. It says hearings are to be conducted by the officer's appointing authority but does not mention civilians.

Gorton is cautious about Thomas' amendment.

"We need time to read and study the bill, and his amendment," she said. "I understand this bill gives council members authority to create it, and I need to hear from them."

Lexington-Fayette Urban County Councilman James Brown said he is not aware of a council member pushing for the amendment but he supports more citizen oversight of police disciplinary procedures.

Brown said he has not

read the amendment "but on the face of it, I would support it."

Brown has pushed for policing reforms as a member of the council, including providing bodyworn cameras to all police officers

Lexington activist Sarah Williams, who has pushed for police reforms and led many racial justice protests, asked Thomas to amend SB 247 to include Lexington.

Williams and others have repeatedly asked for more civilian oversight and input into police discipline. They have been repeatedly told that to do so, there must be a change in state law.

"It's been a six-year push," Williams said.
"Nobody's been willing, until now, to do anything about it on the state level."

The Kentucky Fraternal Order of Police says it is neutral about the Senate bill but generally prefers House Bill 309, which would require a civilian police board in Louisville to get permission from an existing Louisville Metro Council committee before

seeking a court subpoena.
Thomas' amendment to

SB 247 says the civilian board would be subject to the state's open records and meetings laws.

The Senate bill is awaiting consideration by the full Senate. House Bill 309 got through the House March 3 on a 70-23 vote. It is in the Senate State and Local Government Committee.

Woman who sold fake medical product to University of Kentucky sentenced to prison

A Florida business owner has been sentenced to six months in federal prison after selling a potentially dangerous counterfeit mesh that turned up in an operating room at the University of Kentucky Medical Center during brain surgery.

Attorneys for the woman, Janaina Nascimento, sought a probated sentence for her, saying she didn't know the product she sold was counterfeit.

But U.S. District Judge Karen K. Caldwell said the sentence needed to deter others who might be tempted to sell counterfeit medical goods, or be careless in vetting such products.

"The law puts pressure on purchasers and suppliers to exercise care and diligence in their dealings because the public simply cannot tolerate the risk to human life that this kind of error presents," Caldwell said, according to a transcript of the sentencing.

The six-month sentence for Nascimento was the maximum under advisory guidelines.

Caldwell sentenced
Nascimento, of Miami,

last week in federal court in Lexington.

Nascimento also paid \$24,012 to UK to cover what it paid for the product.

The case traces to May 2019 when a neurosurgeon at UK operating on a patient's brain noticed a problem with a product called Surgicel, a fiber hemostat used to control bleeding that can be left in after surgery to be absorbed into a patient's body, according to court documents

The doctor and nurses noticed the hemostat didn't feel or work like the one they typically used and did not put it in the patient, according to court documents.

The surgeon made two more complaints about the mesh that month to the manufacturer, Ethicon, a subsidiary of Johnson & Johnson, according to

court documents.

Johnson & Johnson
traced the hemostat to
Nascimento's company,
Lion Heart Surgical Supply
LLC, in Hollywood, Fla.

An investigation by Johnson & Johnson showed the hemostats originated from a company called Medserve in Delhi, India, before passing through a company in the United Arab Emirates

to Nascimento.

When Johnson & Johnson got a court order to search at the Indian company in October 2019, company representatives and police found a man named Pritamdas Arora had put pieces of nonsterile fabric gauze into packages labeled as Surgicel on the floor of his apartment, according to a court declaration from Geoffrey Potter, a New York attorney who represents Johnson & Johnson.

The apartment was "visibly unclean and certainly not a sterile environment," so the mesh was contaminated, Johnson & Johnson said in one court document.

In addition, tests showed the counterfeit product did not appear have the proper qualities to control bleeding or to be absorbed into a person's body after surgery, raising the potential it could cause complications such as infection and scarring, according to Johnson & Johnson.

Nascimento came to the U.S. from Brazil and worked hard at a variety of jobs before starting her medical-supply company, her attorneys said.

She registered with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, unlike

many competitors, and took precautions to check the validity of the Surgical at issue in the case. She believed it was genuine, her attorneys said in a sentencing memorandum.

sentencing memorandum.
However, the prosecutor, Assistant U.S. Attorney Paul McCaffrey, said Nascimento ignored red flags that the product was not legitimate.

After she initially sold it to another supply company, the owner of that company told her the label said it wasn't supposed to be re-exported to the U.S. and sent it back.

Nascimento then sold the hemostats to another company, but removed the individual packages from the boxes with the warning label before shipping it, according to court documents.

McCaffrey said Nascimento was charged with a misdemeanor because there was conflicting evidence on whether she intended to defraud or mislead anyone.

Still, her conduct was "reckless in the extreme," the prosecutor said.

The counterfeit Surgical was used in many patients, creating "a real potential for harm to them," McCaffrey said during the sentencing last week.

The government asked for a three-month sentence for Nascimento.

Caldwell doubled it, saying that although Nascimento was charged with a misdemeanor, it was among the most serious of offenses.

The kinds of medical devices involved in the case "can make the difference in the life or death of patients who have absolutely no control over the

products that are used on their bodies or, in this case, left in their bodies," Caldwell said, according to a transcript of the sentencing.

"Here, there is clearly no room for fraud," Caldwell said. "There is no room for recklessness. There is no room for error."

The last time the Fiscal Court met there was not a lot that was going on within County Government. That drastically changed a few weeks ago. We started with an ice storm that saw 76% of Jackson County Residents without electricity. That turned into a snow storm that was on and off for the days following, producing high amounts of accumulation, that made several roads impassable. This on top of trees down, electric potes broken and frigid temperatures made for some of the hardest working conditions we have ever seen. Almost every department of the Fiscal Court worked well over 100 hours that week along with many volunteers, fire fighters and National Guard troops that were called upon for assistance. I am very pleased an appreciative of our employees and elected officials. They really stepped up in a time of

great distress. It is the first time I can remember that we have had to open an emergency shelter for citizens without heat or electricity. It had to use a large building in order to accommodate the need and the JCPS allowed us to use Tyner. Not only did they let us use their building, they volunteered to run it. Thank you, Tyner Elementary Staff and JCPS staff for your help during this emergency.

Just when we thought it was inches of rain in a 48 period during er, the southern end of the County has seen the worst of the damage.

We have several homes that are an entire loss and numerous mud slides in Southern Jackson County. I have declared 2 separate State of Emergency's in the last 3 weeks. We have a lot of damage assessing to do within the County before we set down with FEMA officials to discuss what we can expect to receive as far as funding goes. We also will be working with residents that have lost their homes during the flooding to see if they will qualify for individual assistance. These weather events have been a very life altering experience for many of our citizens. It is important for our people to know that we are here to help them. We have 5 different families that are receiving shelter assistance from the Red Cross. We will continue to work with these families in order to help them receive help. It is going to take a lot of time to fix everything we have saw damaged due to flooding and extreme weather. It will be very costly but it has to be repaired as best we can. If our road funding does not increase within the next Fiscal year, we will have a hard time doing what needs to be

done to improve the County road

The USDA -Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) issued the notice to proceed for construction of the Pigeon Roost flood retarding structure (FRS) #3 near McKee, Kentucky beginning work in

This FRS was designed to protect business and residential properties from reoccurring and damaging floods along Pigeon Roost Creek and is a federally assisted action under the authority of the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (PL-566). NRCS estimated that the average annual benefits of the project will be in excess of \$160,000 per year. The


structure probably provided more benefits than that with the protection

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

If you need information about the hauler serving your area, you can call the Transfer Station at **287-7688**.



I sometimes cry at TV commercials and I know it. and other non-sensical triggers.But unlike many with legitimate reasons to be sad or angry or with clinical imbalances that cause them to be unable to control their moods, I typically find that just getting off my chair and doing some physical labor or challenging my brain in some constructive way usually lifts my spirits.

One task that only tends to make me angrier, (and has thus far proven futile), is dealing with the IRS in an attempt to locate the second \$600 stimulus payment that was promised to all Americans.

Some seniors are being discriminated against with respect to these stimulus payments. We are likely to need these boosts to our income and limited budgets more than any other segment of the population.

Those of us older than 65 are likely retired and struggling to live on a single, monthly Social Security payment. Yearly cost of living increases typically amount to less than \$15 a month, the cost of one meal or co-pay for one doctor's visit or one prescription.

It is, after all, our age group that statistics and research have shown are most at risk of contracting and dying from COVID, so shouldn't we be the first to receive the assistance of COVID stimulus?

While I certainly understand that there are many younger people with families, some who have been out of work for months, who are

desperate for assistance, I also know they do have other avenues available, such as unemployment benefits, public assistance and many can (and have) supplemented their income with other temporary employment.

Even prior to the pandemic, seniors are often physically unable to work, don't always have transportation and are seen by most businesses as unemployable. Although we do have more experience, it's unlikely that an employer would hire someone older than 65 for whom health care and other benefits would be more costly and whose length of service to their company would be far less.

I was fortunate to be one of the first to Many times, seniors are forced to receive the original stimulus payment, choose between medication, food or and for that I am most grateful. The first meeting their financial obligations. For payment was deposited directly into my

The IRS had all of my banking information readily available, so it was completely logical that they would automatically make the deposit quickly and easily in this fashion without any input or

When I checked the IRS website in action from me. search of payment no. 2, I saw where the first payment was made, the date it was deposited and the same bank account information as it remains today, so why wouldn't the second payment automatically go into my account?.

I called the IRS 'Get My Stimulus Payment' hotline and was told that, although I no longer file taxes (and didn't prior to receiving the first stimulus check), I will have to file taxes for 2020 to receive the second payment.

I explained that I have no other taxable income to report. The representative to whom I was speaking (obviously reading from the script she had been provided) added that she understood and even commented that her own mother (age 82) was going through the same thing, even though she had received the first payment without any input from her. She hadn't filed taxes for some 15 years, but now was being told she must file taxes to

get her second payment. I am told that some people have received a letter from the IRS, stating that if they haven't received the second payment, they must go on the IRS site and fill

out the 1040 tax form. I've done a little research and it con-

founds me as to why some seniors who have not filed taxes in decades have received both stimulus payments without any input or requirements to file taxes when none were paid, and others who received one payment have not received another.

I have written to our senator, the IRS, and even the White House, to ask for help in this matter. I did this, not only on my own behalf, but to try to bring this issue to the forefront of our lawmakers and politicians for all seniors. I feel we are the most at-risk, most needy, and most unrepresented segment of our society.

I pointed out in my calls and communications that, not only are seniors less likely to be able to seek assistance from a tax service this year because we are being told to stay home and stay safe; but there are many who do not have access to a computer or the knowledge of technology to file the forms they are telling us we

If you are experiencing the same delays and challenges as I have described, speak out. Call the IRS. You'll be on hold for up to an hour before they answer your call, but hang in there and wait your turn in the queue. Just put your phone on speaker and go about your business while listening to some classical music on their

answering machine. Additionally, write to your congressmen, senators, the president and the IRS.

Make your voices heard. Remember, the squeaky wheel gets the oil and hopefully, the loudest voices will get the money owed to us.







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Protecting Our Waterways And Saving Our Streambanks

At this point in winter, a longing for spring and the outdoors is usually knocking. Greener pastures, trees blossoming, and streams flowing as winter melts away ushering in those spring rains. With the changing seasons comes changes to our streams and local waterbodies. Where does all that snowmelt and rainwater go, and how does it affect me? There are a couple sayings in the water community, "we all live in a watershed" and "we all live downstream," but what do these mean and what are the implications?

A watershed is an area of land where the water that flows across or under drains to a common body of water. When we look

towards most maps of the United States, we see our country divided by states. Looking at an individual state, it is then broken down further into counties and towns. We can think of our watersheds in the same way. A watershed can be a small portion of the county you live in, but when combining multiple watersheds, they can grow into multistate areas or larger, think the Mississippi River Basin. Recognizing these natural divisions of water, that ignore county lines, is important to maintaining the health of every person and animal that lives within them -"We all live in a watershed!"

Depending on where you live, your local watershed is most likely where you get your drinking water and includes the stream that runs right through your backyard or favorite park. Every drop of rain or snow that falls in your watershed will either be absorbed into the soil, or it will flow over the landscape to a local waterbody. As this water flows over land, it picks up pollutants like sedi-

ment, trash, nitrogen and phosphorus from excess fertilizers, bacteria in human waste from failing septic systems or sewer lines, pet and livestock waste, oils, grease, and chemicals from roads and parking lots before it reaches the water. These pollutants not only affect your local waterways, but can also affect drinking water sources miles downstream, or in the direction the stream water flows. The type and quantity of pollutants that reach our waterways affect local water quality in our watershed and beyond - "We

Protecting our waterways allows us to enjoy the multiple benefits that are associated with its protection, including a clean drinking water source and safe waters for recreation. Consciously being aware of our impact on waterways helps protect them.

We can help in small ways that make a big impact by properly disposing of trash and car fluids, picking up pet waste, and learning sustainable lawn care practices. Looking to our streams, streamside plantings, also referred to as riparian buffers, and streambank stabilization and restoration projects have long lasting roles in protecting our waterways and improving water quality. Bluegrass Greensource works with a grant

from the U.S. EPA under §319(h) of the Clean Water Act to improve the water quality of our local waterways. Coming this March, Bluegrass Greensource is hosting the Saving Our Streambanks Virtual Workshop Series. The series is FREE and open to the public. As an attendee, you will learn the information, tools, and resources needed to shop schedule, speaker list, establish streamside buffers and stabilize streamand more can be found on the banks on your property and in our communities. The series is on Tues/Thurs, March 9th-25th, 2021 from 3-4 PM via ZOOM. Speakers include folks

from Roundstone Native Seed, Beaver Creek Hydrology, Oakland Farm Trees, Ironweed Nursery, Bluegrass Greensource, and regional reps from NRCS, Soil and Water Conservation District, and UK Extension Service. Mini cost-share grant applications will be available to those who attend for streamside buffer establishment in the Hinkston Creek watershed in Bourbon, Montgomery, and Nicholas Counties, Grants are reimbursable up to \$2,000! Registration, the full workshop schedule, speaker list, and more can be found on the website at bggreensource.org/riparian-buffers/

A streamside, or riparian, buffer is a vegetated strip or zone along a stream that contains a combination of trees, grasses, shrubs, and perennials. Plant roots in the buffer filter out excess nitrogen and phosphorus in the stormwater runoff, as well as, sediment, bacteria and other pollutants. The buffers also help prevent streambank erosion and provide a habitat for various aquatic and terrestrial species. Not only is there an obvious benefit to the water quality of the stream, but a riparian buffer can be very aesthet ically pleasing as well. Whenever you go to your favorite park, what can be so enjoyable is the scenery and native plants. Yet, a riparian buffer's beauty doesn't have to stop at the park. Bluegrass Greensource, and other organizations, offer cost-share programs and guidance on how to establish your own riparian buffer. Register for the workshop series to learn more!

The benefits of protecting our waterways are endless. From our drinking water, to a location where we can go relax and enjoy time with our families, the maintenance of our watershed is key to the improvement of our quality of living. 

"... We're allowed in (to visit) every day of the week now, which is fantastic.'

He saw his parents every day since restrictions were eased, "and I'll be in there today," he said last Thursdav.

On Debbie Tichenor's second visit with her mom. Helen Smith, they had a lot of time to catch up and absorb what they hadn't been able to do for nearly a year. They spent two hours or so together, sharing family photos and talking about what had happened over the last year, said Tichenor. "It was very exciting," she said.

It was difficult for her to find the words to explain how she felt when she saw her 93-year-old mom again after all she's been through.

Smith had congestive heart failure in May and was the first resident at Daisy Hill diagnosed with COVID-19 – surviving both, Tichenor said. "I can't believe how strong she is," she continued. "All she went through and here we are now, back together again."

"That's one of the reasons why she just made it through," she added, "Daisy Hill did such a good job of taking care of her."

Tichenor said she was excited to see other residents as well. One who'd been in a knitting class with her – before COVID restrictions - could not believe how many hats she'd made over the last year, Tichenor said.

It took that first visit last Monday for Tichenor to realize she was actually in her momma's apartment again, and giving her advice on what clothes she'd wear that day.

Shaw called it important to do "what we can" to get his parents re-engaged in family life and daily activities. "So," he added, "we're just glad to be able go in and see them and spend time with them again."

All of Daisy Hill's residents received their second dose of the COVID vaccine Jan. 20, Dorough said. There hasn't been an active coronavirus case at Daisy Hill since early December, she added.

Prior to state guidelines being eased for long-term care facilities, only virtual, window and screened-porch (last summer and early fall) visits were permitted at Daisy Hill Senior Living.

"The residents have been fabulous, and the families have been very understanding (during the past 11 months of the restrictions on visits)," Dorough said. "But that's not to say there haven't been tough days and sad moments, where residents ... missed seeing them ... So I think (being able to visit with loved ones in their rooms), it's helped the morale of the residents." She said restrictions on in-person visits were implemented at Daisy Hill in March 2020.

Residents are still asked to wear masks whenever they are out of their apartments, and "it's almost a habit now," Dorough said. They are eating together in Daisy Hill's dining room

continues, "but I can introduce them to the Book that can save them. So I want to do that. That's what drives me nowadays."

Born Feb. 12, 1945, David Greene says Versailles has always been home. He attended Simmons School before integration, spent his junior and senior years at Versailles High School, and doesn't ever remember having any racial problems with other students.

"I looked forward to going," says Greene, "primarily because of the football. We didn't have a football team at Simmons.' The 1963 VHS graduate

says he and Charlie Brown were the only Black players on the State Championship football team in 1962. "I was small," Greene

says, "but I was fast." At 5-foot-4, 145 pounds, he relied on his speed to cover an opposing team's receiver. After graduating from high school, Greene says he

wanted to become a physical education teacher, but that aspiration evaporated after a semester at Kentucky State University. By 1965, Greene was married to Mary Carter

Greene. "We were childhood sweethearts," he says. They raised three sons, David Jr., Damon (who died April 6, 2020) and Derrick.

After Mary died in January 2011, Greene says he moved into a two-bedroom apartment because "that's all I needed." The home he had shared in married life 'ceased to be a home. It was just a house. And it brought back painful memories, while I was there living by myself," he says.

Twice retired

Greene was a nightshift processor "sorting the mail" with the U.S. Postal Service for 31 years until his retirement in 2006. "It paid the bills," he says.

"For a person who didn't have a (college) degree, it paid pretty good," but acknowledges he didn't enjoy his work.

Greene says after his wife's death he began going to the Woodford County Senior Citizens Center, as a fulltime bus driving position six years ago. He had been a part-time driver for two years before that.

"It was a fulfilling job for me. I really enjoyed that. I enjoyed what I was doing," wherever he was needed, but especially enjoyed driving seniors to their doctor's appointments, to the grocery store or to get

their hair cut. "It was kind of trying at times," Greene acknowledges, "but I loved doing it. I've been around older people pretty much all my life, and I enjoy working

"It was one job I really loved doing." Often, his work "did as much for me as it did for them," he says.

When the senior center

and also participating in closed - and lunches were because of COVID-19, Greene's job focused on delivering meals to seniors in the community. "I was kind of apprehensive ... a little nervous," about going into homes to deliver meals, he says. "I didn't want to do that, so I thought it was a good time for me to just walk away from it."

Yet, he didn't really walk away at the end of December. Not completely.

Greene, an ordained Baptist minister, will sometimes find himself reaching out to a senior or answering a call for help. Most recently, he sat – and prayed -with a mother who lost her adult son. "It was an honor for me and a privilege ..." he says of such experiences. Through all of the ups

and downs in his own life, "I feel that God is blessing me ... because I still have the opportunity to share the word of God," Green explains.

The deaths of a son and his wife hurt, but Greene knows he didn't really lose them, because "we'll meet up again at that great reunion ... together with Him," he says.

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
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


