Dear Public Service Commission

2022-00098

East Kentucky Power Cooperative power the lives of 1.1 million Kentuckians through 16 cooperative members. The generation is based on coal and natural gas close to fifty: fifty. The power travels through 2,800 miles of high-voltage transmission lines from Maysville and Somerset to reach some 370 substations and 560,000 members meters.

EKCP highlights its commitment to environmental stewardship through the available Cooperative Solar Farm One, generating electricity for 1,000 homes on a 60 acres farm in Winchester.

In "Planning for the Future," EKPC talk about sustainability, providing affordable, reliable, evercleaner energy, and they are committed to providing

- 35% reduction in total CO2 emissions by 2035 (reductions based on 2010 emissions)
- 70% reduction in total CO2 emissions by 2050 (reductions based on 2010 emissions)
- 10% energy from renewables by 2030 (not including renewable assets of 2019)
- 15% energy from renewables by 2035 (not including renewable assets of 2019)

The website and other member-utility publications clearly express ratepayers' desire for cleaner and more affordable energy. The grave impact of natural disasters has sparked people to want their utilities to take appropriate action that can no longer be postponed.

Unfortunately, the website only has good intentions about the day-to-day operation. It doesn't go beyond a commitment "to reducing, reusing, and recycling" or "replacing wood poles with steel posts in hard-to-reach areas." The company's "grid resiliency strategy" is about "readiness for disasters and restoring operations quickly."

In its' 16 members' interest and their need to improve, a company this size must have clearly stated strategies in the IRP for all 16 members, how to meet the above goals, and the growing demand for clean and affordable power. The cost of electricity varies considerably among the 16 coops, from Salt River Electric, with rates at 8-9 cents/kWh, to Grayson, at 13-14 cents/kWh. That alone shows the urgent need to act, find better ways, and have much better leadership.

To address grid resilience properly, as it clearly is a problem, microgrids and underground power lines must be incorporated strategically in hard-to-reach areas where the terrain is challenging for above-ground transmission. Some utilities are now leasing their poles also to carry glass fiber optics. Hopefully, they'll capitalize on this to invest more quickly in the many areas of need.

According to another large power provider NextEra Energy *, solar with four-hour battery storage will cost \$17-24/MWh, and wind coupled with a 4-hour battery system will cost \$14-21/MWH. An existing natural gas-fired power plant will cost 35-47/MWh to operate.

The 16 member cooperatives could be tasked to identify areas suitable for solar farms with storage both in areas where transmission is vulnerable and in new housing developments. The need for new substations should be forecasted to further improve the future of our grid resilience.

When will there be a second Farm, or perhaps sixteen? Only responsible leadership is required.
