CLCP candidates have one year from their last seminar to complete the certification project. One six-month (180-day) extension will be granted if requested by a supervisor, in writing, to the program administrator. If more time is needed, one additional six-month extension may be granted, if the task force believes there is sufficient cause. This request must also be in writing from a supervisor. No more than two extensions will be granted. If the project is not completed by the extension date, the candidate will be required to complete the entire Loss Control Internship again, including all four seminars.

I'd like to thank you for your participation in this unique internship program. I sensed a strong desire of most participants to complete the program and continue with their safety profession even more committed than before. 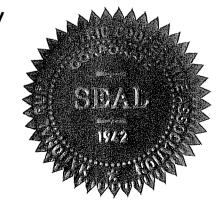

8:30-9:00 **Opening/Welcome**

9:00 – 9:45 SESSION FIVE Division of Employment Standards, Apprenticeship and Mediation

Overview of Kentucky's Wage and Hour Laws, including: minimum wage, overtime, record keeping, rest breaks and meal periods, illegal deductions, child labor, salaried employees, prevailing wage hearing procedure and rate implementation. Brief overview of Registered Apprenticeship and Mediation programs.

9:45-10:30 SESSION SIX Office of General Counsel

The disturbing trend toward erroneously classifying workers as "independent contractors" or "subcontractors" is catching the attention of government agencies from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to the Department of Unemployment Insurance. The General Counsel of the Kentucky Labor Cabinet will focus on common misconceptions about the classification of workers/employees and explain the legal analysis for determining their proper employment classification.

10:45-11:15 SESSION THREE Office of Federal-State Coordinator

The Office of the Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Federal-State Coordinator includes the Coordinator, an OSH Program Coordinator, and the Office of Standards Interpretation and Development. The Office of Standards Interpretation and Development includes two (2) Standards Specialists who provide technical support to Kentucky OSH Program staff, respond to inquiries, and promulgate regulations. This session will examine the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's (OSHA) new direction in enforcement, rule making, and emphasis programs. Other topics may include the relationship between the Kentucky OSH Program and OSHA, standards interpretation, and the promulgation of regulations.

12:45- 2:15 SESSION FOUR Department of Workers' Claims

An overview of Kentucky's Workers' Compensation System will be presented. Who is covered, who is exempt, what benefits are available and how do you go about receiving those benefits. How to protect your business by insuring you comply with the law. What statutory requirements must be met before benefits will be delivered.

Drug Free Workplace Safety is the number one reason why employers apply and become certified in the voluntary Drug Free Workplace Program. The regulation 803 KAR 25:280 became effective in June 2008 and, if certified by the DWC, employers could save up to 5 percent on their workers' compensation insurance premiums. The five main requirements of the program are a written policy, drug testing, education, training, and implementing an EAP. During this session we will explain the regulation and the specific requirements necessary to complete the checklist and application process for certification. The DWC staff is also available to provide training and guidance to employers and their staff.

2:15 – 3:15 **SESSION ONE** *Division of Education and Training*

Overview of the facts and services offered by the Division of OSH Education and Training. How to request a complete or partial safety or health survey, free training on various safety and health topics, technical assistance and partnership opportunities to assist with compliance assistance.

3:15 – 4:00 SESSION TWO Division of OSH Compliance

OSH Compliance is the enforcement arm of the Kentucky Occupational Safety and Health Program. This presentation will be a brief overview of the compliance program covering authority, inspections, citations, penalties, and other statutory and regulatory mandates. OSH Compliance also administers the OSH discrimination program and will provide a brief overview of the program and the employee's rights to a safe and healthful workplace.
