

RULES AND REGULATIONS

A. General

1. SCOPE

This Schedule of Rules and Regulations is a part of all contracts for receiving electric service from the Cooperative and applies to all service received from the Cooperative whether the service received is based upon a contract, agreement, signed application, or otherwise. No employee or individual director of the Cooperative is permitted to make an exception to rates or Rules and Regulations. Rates and service information can be obtained from the Cooperative's Office.

2. REVISIONS

These Rules and Regulations may be revised, amended, supplemented or otherwise changed from time to time without notice. Such changes when effective shall have the same force as the present Rules and Regulations. The members shall be informed of any changes as soon as possible, after adoption by the Board of Directors, through the Cooperative's monthly newsletter.

3. CONSUMER'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR COOPERATIVE'S PROPERTY

All meters, service connections, and other equipment furnished by the Cooperative shall be, and remain, the property of the Cooperative. The member shall exercise proper care to protect the property of the Cooperative on its premises and in the event of loss or damage to the Cooperative's property arising from neglect of member to care for same, the cost of necessary repairs or replacement shall be paid by the member.

4. CONTINUITY OF SERVICE

The Cooperative shall use reasonable diligence to provide a constant and uninterrupted supply of electric power and energy, but if such supply shall fail or be interrupted or become defective through act of God, or the public enemy, or by accident, strikes, labor troubles, or by action of the elements, or inability to secure rights-of-way or other permits needed, or for any other cause beyond the reasonable control of the Cooperative, the Cooperative shall not be liable therefor.

5. RELOCATION OF LINES BY REQUEST OF MEMBERS

The Cooperative's established lines will not be relocated unless the expense for moving and relocating is paid by the member, except in instances where it would be to the advantage of the Cooperative to make such relocation.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

6. SERVICES PERFORMED FOR MEMBERS

The Cooperative's personnel is prohibited from making repairs or performing services to the members' equipment or property except in cases of emergency or to protect the public or member's person or property. When such emergency services are performed, the member shall be charged for such service at the rate of time and material.

B. Service Procedures

7. APPLICATION FOR SERVICE

Each prospective member desiring electric service will be required to sign the Cooperative's form, "Application for Membership and For Electric Service", before service is supplied by the Cooperative and provide the Cooperative with necessary easements or right-of-way permits.

8. MEMBERSHIP FEE

The membership fee in the Corporation shall be \$10.00 (Ten Dollars). One membership must be held in connection with each separate or non-contiguous property for which service is taken and for each different class of service desired; provided, however, that commercial and residential service may be obtained upon one membership if the commercial activity is carried on in the residence of the owner. The membership fee will be refunded if all bills are paid or applied against any unpaid bills of the member at the time service is discontinued, which will automatically terminate the membership. Service covered by each membership shall be metered and billed separately.

9. RIGHT OF ACCESS

The Cooperative's identified employees shall have access to member's premises at all reasonable times for the purpose of reading meter, testing, repairing, removing, or exchanging any and all equipment belonging to the Cooperative.

10. MEMBER'S DISCONTINUANCE OF SERVICE

Any member desiring service discontinued or changed from one location to another shall give the Cooperative three (3) days' notice in person or in writing provided such notice does not violate contractual obligations.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

11. Connection Charges

The Cooperative will make no charge for connecting service for a new member, when made during normal working hours. If requested by the new member a connection may be made after the normal working hours, which includes, but is not limited to Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays provided the new member pays a connection charge of \$15.00.

If after a new member is connected the member desires to be disconnected at his present location and connected at a new location, there shall be no connection charge made to such member, unless this service is done after normal working hours, at the members request, in which case a connection charge of \$15.00 would be made.

If a member desires to be disconnected at his present location and later desires connection at the same location within twelve months, a \$6.00 connect fee will be charged. If this same service is required by member after the normal working hours, the connect fee will be increased to \$15.00.

All connection fees are to be paid in advance or at time service is rendered.

12. Resale of Power By Members

All purchased electric service used on the premises of the member shall be supplied exclusively by the Cooperative, and the member shall not directly or indirectly sell, sublet, or otherwise dispose of the electric service or any part thereof.

13. Service Charge

All service calls made by the Cooperative pertaining to the Consumers premises shall be charged at the rate of \$6.00 per call. Said charge to be paid in advance or at time service is performed.

14. Service Charges For Temporary Service

Consumers requiring temporary service (except those qualifying under Rate Schedule T) may be required to pay all costs of connecting and disconnecting incidental to the supplying and removing of service. In addition to this, a deposit will be required to cover estimated consumption of electricity. Both fees will be paid in advance. Any balance remaining at the end of temporary service will be refunded. This rule applies to carnivals, fairs, house trailers and the like.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

15. MEMBER SERVICE EXTENSIONS

It is the desire and intention of the Cooperative to make central station service available to all persons and property within the Cooperative's operating area consistent with sound economy and good management. To accomplish this intention, the following schedule of monthly minimum bills and minimum contract periods for constructing single phase extensions and connecting members along existing lines shall apply and remain in effect for a period of five (5) years after date of energizing the extension:

0 - 1000 ft.....\$2.35	1700-1800 ft.....\$4.35
1000 - 1100 ft..... 2.60	1800-1900 ft..... 4.60
1100 - 1200 ft..... 2.85	1900-2000 ft..... 4.85
1200 - 1300 ft..... 3.10	2000-2100 ft..... 5.10
1300 - 1400 ft..... 3.35	2100-2200 ft..... 5.35
1400 - 1500 ft..... 3.60	2200-2300 ft..... 5.60
1500 - 1600 ft..... 3.85	2300-2400 ft..... 5.85
1600 - 1700 ft..... 4.10	2400 ft. and over - 25¢ per additional 100 ft.

Payment of an increased monthly minimum shall entitle the consumer in all cases to the use of the number of kilowatt hours corresponding to the minimum charge in accordance with the appropriate rate schedule.

Any single or three phase extension that is questionable in the sense that it might be temporary, such as mines, oil wells, etc., the Consumer is required to pay for construction of line and is given credit for 20% of each monthly power bill until the cost of the line is refunded. Should the Consumer cease operations, he forfeits the remainder of his deposit.

The owner shall execute a special contract stating minimum monthly bill, tenure of contract and any other special conditions, and if of questionable duration, may be secured by real estate mortgage or other acceptable security. After five (5) years the minimum shall revert to the basic minimum of the rate schedule under which the member is being billed.

On extensions where higher minimums have been established, the minimum shall be adjusted in consideration of new members added, provided the additions of the new members will reduce the minimum bill rate.

16. Meter Tests *C - Meters*

All new meters shall be checked for accuracy before installation. The Cooperative will, at its own expense, make periodical tests and inspections of its meters in order to maintain a high standard of accuracy and to conform with the regulations of the Public Service Commission. The Cooperative will make additional tests of meters at the request of the member, provided the member does not request such test more frequently than one in twelve (12) months and upon payment of a fee of \$2.00 (Two Dollars) paid in advance. When the test made at the member's request shows that the meter is accurate within 2% slow or fast, no adjustment will be made to the member's bill and the fee paid will be forfeited to cover cost of requested test. When the test shows the meter to be in excess of 2% fast or slow, an adjustment shall be made to the member's bill by recalculating the monthly bills for a period equal to one-half (½) of the time lapsed since the last previous test, but in no case shall this period exceed three (3) months, and the cost of testing the meter found to be inaccurate will be borne by the Cooperative and the \$2.00 (Two Dollars) fee paid by the member will be refunded.

17. Failure Of Meter To Register

In the event a member's meter should fail to register, the member shall be billed from the date of such failure at the average consumption of the member based on the three (3) month period immediately preceding the failure.

18. Discontinuance Of Service By Cooperative

The Cooperative may discontinue service or refuse to connect service to any member for the violation of any of its rules and regulations. The Cooperative may without notice discontinue service to any member for the theft of current or the appearance of current-theft devices on the premises of the member. The Cooperative may discontinue service to any member at any or all locations, if there is any debt owed the Cooperative which is past due, after compliance with any applicable section of Rule Number 22. The discontinuance of service by the Cooperative for any cause stated in this rule does not release the member of his obligations of all debts due.

19. Point Of Delivery

D - Consumer Equipment

The point of delivery is the point as designated by the Cooperative on member's premises where current is to be delivered to building or premises, namely the meter. All wiring and equipment beyond this point of delivery shall be supplied by and maintained by the member. The member will, however, notify the Cooperative of any proposed changes in his equipment or wiring which will materially increase or decrease his load so the Cooperative may check its equipment to make certain it will accommodate the consumer's load requirement.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

20. Consumer's Wiring

All wiring of the member must conform to Cooperative's requirements and accepted modern standards. The member agrees to construct its facilities in accordance with specifications at least equal to those prescribed by the National Electric Safety Code and the Bureau of Standards. The Cooperative however, assumes no responsibility in respect to the type, standard of construction, protective equipment or the condition of the member's property and will not be liable for any loss or injury to persons or property occurring on the premises or property of the member. The member agrees to operate and maintain its facilities so as not to interfere with the service of the Cooperative to its other members. The member will have complete responsibility for all construction, operation, and maintenance beyond the meter and will save the Cooperative harmless against liability for injury or damages resulting in any manner from construction, location, operation, or maintenance of the member's facilities. The minimum wiring requirements acceptable by the Cooperative are as follows:

1. Existing Houses Not Previously Wired

- A. Size of service entrance conductors and main fuse panel to be determined by the proposed load and conditions set forth in the National Electrical Code.
- B. Sixty (60) ampere six circuit panel supplied with three (3) #6 service entrance conductors enclosed in conduit will be the MINIMUM requirements.
- C. All rooms must be wired. Every room and basement must have one (1) or more receptacles.
- D. Two-inch rigid conduit will be the MINIMUM requirement where service entrance conduit is used for a riser.

2. New House Construction

- A. Size of service entrance conductors and main service panel to be determined by the proposed load and conditions as set forth in the National Electric Code.

- B. MINIMUM size service entrance conductors will be three (3) #2R or three (3) #3RH conductors or service entrance cable with a 100 ampere main fuse disconnect.
- C. EXCEPTION - In any house, 750 square foot or less, three (3) #6 entrance conductors with a sixty (60) ampere six circuit panel may be used.
- D. Where two-inch rigid conduit is used for the riser, the bolts for the support of the conduit must go through the brick, stone, or the sheeting and fastened through the studs or the header. Two eye clamps with set screw must be used and placed approximately 12" above the meter base and 12" below the eaves or cornice. Meter base to be fastened with lead tamps, expanders, toggle or wire bolts.
- E. All wiring is to meet the National Electrical Code and the Kentucky Uniform Wiring Code.

3. Meter Pole Installation

- A. All meter pole installations must be provided with a main fuse switch or circuit breaker mounted below the meter, having capacity of the total diversified load which the meter pole will serve. The meter loop assembly will be supplied by the consumer and the Cooperative will furnish the service pole.
- B. All installations and wiring of the meter pole must meet National Electric Code and REA requirements.

4. Special Conditions

- A. All new houses or buildings must have a rough-in and final inspection. All existing houses being wired must have final inspection.

- B. City water piping system must be used for service grounding when available plus standard driven ground. (Watch for plastic pipe).
- C. All grounds other than the water system are to be of 3/4" galvanized water pipe equipped with a driving point.
- D. Any deviations from above requirement must be approved by the Manager of the Cooperative.

5. Service to Residential Mobile Homes

- A. All extensions of up to 300 feet from the nearest facility shall be made without charge.
- B. Extensions greater than 300 feet from the nearest facility and up to 1,000 feet shall be made provided the applicant pay the Cooperative a "consumer advance for construction" of \$150.00 in addition to any other charges required by the Cooperative for all consumers. This advance shall be refunded at the end of one year provided that a mobile home has remained connected and receiving service at that location for that length of time.
- C. For extensions greater than 1,000 feet the extension policies set forth in PSC Rule X shall apply.

21. Inspection

All consumer's wiring must be inspected for compliance with the National Electric Code by an inspector approved by the Cooperative before connection for service by the Cooperative. Fee for such inspection shall be paid at the Cooperative's office.

When any of the employees of the Cooperative have notice or observe that the wiring in any building, to which electric energy is served by the Cooperative, is in a condition so as to be dangerous to persons or property such employees shall immediately notify the Manager of the Cooperative of such dangerous conditions. If the Manager upon investigation determines that such dangerous conditions exists, he may at once have the service to

the building where such condition exists discontinued and service shall not be restored to said premises until said building has been rewired and inspected and the certificate of the inspector certifies that the wiring in said building complies with all the rules and regulations of the National Electric Code of the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Unless said certificate is furnished, no service of electric energy shall be supplied to the said building or to the premises.

E. Electric Bills

22. Billing

Members will receive statements for electric service on the fifth day of each month for service rendered for a thirty-day period ending the fifteenth of the preceding month. All statements are due and payable upon receipt and shall be paid at the office of the Cooperative within ten (10) days from date of bill. Failure to receive electrical statement will not release the member from payment obligation. Should the statement not be paid as above, the Cooperative may at any time thereafter on a five (5) notice to the member discontinue service. Should it become necessary for the Cooperative's representative to call at the Consumer's premises or other locations for the purpose of collecting a delinquent account, a charge of \$6.00 (Six Dollars) will be made to the member's account for the extra service rendered, due and payable at time such delinquent account is collected. If service is disconnected for non-payment, an additional charge of \$6.00 (Six Dollars) will be made for reconnecting service due and payable at time of such reconnection.

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BY ENGINEERING DIVISION

23. Meter Reading

Each member receiving service will be required to supply the Cooperative with the reading of each meter on the form as furnished by the Cooperative on such date as designated by the Cooperative. Upon failure by the member to supply the Cooperative with such meter reading for three (3) consecutive meter reading dates, the Cooperative shall act by having its representative read the members' meter and a service charge of \$6.00 (Six Dollars) will be made for the extra service rendered. The service charge will be made to the member's account and will be due and payable upon notice of said charge. In the event that an error in meter reading should be made or member fails to send in meter-reading card, the member shall pay for that month either the minimum bill for the service which he receives, or, if he should be a large user, he shall pay an amount approximately equal to his average bill. Then the following month his bill shall be computed on the regular schedule prorated for two months and the amount paid shall be credited.

24. UNPAID CHECKS FROM CONSUMERS

When a check received in payment of a consumer's account is returned unpaid by the bank for any reason, the Cooperative will notify such consumer by letter stating the amount of the check and the reason for its return. Returned checks will be considered same as a delinquent account, and, if payment in full is not received for check within five (5) days after notice, service to such consumer will be discontinued as prescribed under that section of Rule 22 dealing with unpaid accounts.

25. BILLING ADJUSTED TO STANDARD PERIODS

In case of the first billing of a new account and the final billing of an account where the period covered by the billing is a fraction of a month, the demand charge and/or the energy used will be prorated for proportional part of the billing period when computing such bill.

26. DEPOSITS

A deposit or suitable guarantee approximately equal to two times the average monthly bill may be required of any member before service is supplied if the Cooperative deems it necessary to insure payment for the service it will render. The Cooperative may at its own option return the deposit after six (6) months. Upon termination of service, deposit may be applied against unpaid bills of the member, and if any balance remains after such application is made, said balance to be refunded to the member.

F. Classification of Consumers

27. PURPOSE OF CLASSIFICATION

Classification is a means for treating without discrimination. All members having similar characteristics in their use of service. Special classification will be avoided unless surrounding conditions are so unusual that to apply one of the existing rates or rules would result in serious injustice to either the particular member or to all other members.

28. FARM CONSUMER

A farm is any operating unit consisting of three acres or more and annually producing agricultural products, exclusive of home garden, with a value of \$150.00 (One Hundred and Fifty Dollars) or more; or a farming unit of less than three (3) acres with a value of agricultural products sold amounting to \$150.00 (One Hundred and Fifty Dollars) or more. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under Rate Schedule "A-1".

29. NON-FARM RESIDENTIAL CONSUMER

A non-farm residential consumer shall be any residential consumer not qualifying as an operating unit under Rule 28. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under Rate Schedule "A-1".

30. COMMERCIAL CONSUMER

A commercial consumer will be any business establishment such as a store, office, garage, tavern, creamery, factory, hotel, tourist cabin resort, or institution other than schools, churches, or community halls. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under Rate Schedule "B-1", "LP-1" or "OPS".

31. RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENT OCCUPYING SAME PREMISES DESIRING SERVICE THROUGH A SINGLE METER

A member operating a commercial establishment on the same premises as his residence may be served through a single meter and shall be classified as a commercial consumer. If, however, the consumer prefers, it is not necessary for him to take all of his service under the commercial rate. Instead, the business establishment may be served under the commercial rate and his residence served under the farm and home rate. In this case, two (2) meters will be required.

32. PROCESSING OF FARM PRODUCTS

If the processing of farm products is done on the consumer's farm and is applied to farm products raised principally by the consumer, he shall be classified as a farm consumer; otherwise, he shall be classified as a commercial consumer.

33. LARGE POWER CONSUMER

A large power consumer will generally be recognized as a commercial or power consumer requiring more than 25 KVA of transformer capacity. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall have the option of being billed under Rate Schedule "OPS" or "LP". Terms and conditions for serving large power consumers shall be determined individually.

34. SEASONAL RESIDENTIAL CONSUMER

A season residential consumer shall be classified as any non-farm residential consumer who normally uses electric service for a house or cabin for a fractional part of a year. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under Rate Schedule "A-1".

36. ELECTRICAL UNDERGROUND EXTENSIONS FOR NEW RESIDENTIAL SUBDIVISIONS

A. Purpose of Policy

The purpose of this policy is to formulate South Kentucky RECC requirements for underground electrical service, the application of which will insure adequate service and safety to all persons engaged in the construction, maintenance, operation or use of underground facilities and to the public in general.

B. Applicability

This policy shall apply to all underground electrical supply facilities used in connection with electric service distribution in new residential subdivisions after the effective date of this policy.

C. Definitions

The following words and terms, when used in this policy, shall have the meaning indicated:

Applicant - the developer, builder or other person, partnership, association, corporation or governmental agency applying for the installation of an underground electric distribution system.

Building - a structure enclosed within exterior walls or fire walls, built, erected and framed of component structural parts and designed for less than five (5) family occupancy.

Multiple-Occupancy Building - a structure enclosed within exterior walls or fire walls, built, erected and framed of component structural parts and designed to contain five (5) or more individual dwelling units.

Distribution System - electric service facilities consisting of primary and secondary conductors, transformers, and necessary accessories and appurtenances for the furnishing of electric power at utilization voltage.

Subdivision - the tract of land which is divided into ten (10) or more lots for the construction of new residential buildings, or the land on which is constructed two (2) or more new multiple occupancy buildings.

Trenching and Backfilling - opening and preparing the ditch for the installation of conductors including placing of raceways under roadways, driveways, or paved areas; providing a sand bedding below and above conductors when required; and back-fill of trench to ground level.

D. Rights of Way and Easements

- 1. The Cooperative shall construct, own, operate, and maintain distribution lines only along easements, public streets, roads, and highways which are by legal right accessible to the utility's equipment and which the utility has the legal right to occupy, and on the public lands and private property across which rights of way and easements satisfactory to the Cooperative are provided without cost or condemnation by the Cooperative.
2. Rights of way and easements suitable to the Cooperative for the underground distribution facilities must be furnished by the Applicant in reasonable time to meet service requirements. The Applicant shall make the area in which the underground distribution facilities are to be located accessible to the Cooperative's equipment, remove all obstructions from such area, stake to show property lines and final grade, perform rough grading to a reasonable approximation of final grade, and maintain clearing and grading during construction by the Cooperative. Suitable land rights shall be granted to the Cooperative obligating the Applicant and subsequent property owners to provide continuing access to the utility for operation, maintenance or replacement of its facilities, and to prevent any encroachment in the utility's easement or substantial changes in grade or elevation thereof.

E. Installation of Underground Distribution System Within New Subdivision

- 1. Where appropriate contractual arrangements have been made, the Cooperative shall install within the subdivision an underground electric distribution system of sufficient capacity and suitable materials which, in its judgment, will assure that the property owners will receive safe and adequate electric service for the foreseeable future.

2. All single-phase conductors installed by the utility shall be underground. Appurtenances such as transformers, pedestal-mounted terminals, switching equipment and meter cabinets may be placed above ground.
3. Multi-phase primary mains or feeders required within a subdivision to supply local distribution or to serve individual multi-phase loads may be overhead unless underground is required by governmental authority or chosen by the Applicant, in either of which case the differential cost of underground shall be borne by the Applicant.
4. If the Applicant has complied with the requirements herein and has given the Cooperative not less than 120 days' written notice prior to the anticipated date of completion (i.e., ready for occupancy) of the first building in the subdivision, the Cooperative shall complete the installation 30 days prior to the estimated completion date. (Subject to weather and ground conditions and availability of materials and barring extraordinary or emergency circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the Cooperative.) However, nothing in this policy shall be interpreted to require the Cooperative to extend service to portions of the subdivisions not under active development.
5. A non-refundable payment shall be made by the Applicant equal to the difference between the cost of providing underground facilities and that of providing overhead facilities. The payment to be made by Applicant shall be determined from the total footage of single-phase primary, secondary, and service conductor to be installed at an average per foot cost differential in accordance with the Average Cost Differential filed herewith as Appendix A, which Average Cost Differential shall be updated annually as required by order dated February 2, 1973, of the Public Service Commission of Kentucky in Administrative Case No. 146. (Three (3) wire secondary and service conductor runs shall be considered as one conductor, i.e. triplex.) The average cost differential per foot, as stated, is representative of construction is soil free of rock, shale, or other impairments which increase cost of construction.

Where rock, shale, or other impairments are anticipated or encountered in construction the actual increased cost of trenching and backfilling shall be borne by the Applicant.

6. The Applicant may be required to deposit the entire estimated cost of the extension. If this is done, the amount deposited in excess of the normal charge for the underground extensions, as provided in paragraph 5 above, shall be refunded to the applicant over a ten (10) year period as provided in Public Service Commission Rule Elec-1-X-3.
7. The Applicant may be required to perform all necessary trenching and backfilling in accordance with the Cooperative's specifications. The Cooperative shall then credit the applicant's cost in an amount equal to the Cooperative's normal cost for trenching and backfilling.
8. The Cooperative shall furnish, install, and maintain the service lateral to the Applicant's meter base, which normally will be at the corner of the building nearest the point to be served.
9. Plans for the location of all facilities to be installed shall be approved by the Cooperative and the Applicant prior to construction. Alterations in plans by the Applicant which require additional cost of installation or construction shall be at the sole expense of the Applicant.
10. The Cooperative shall not be obligated to install any facility within a subdivision until satisfactory arrangements for the payment of charges have been completed by the Applicant.
11. The charges specified in these rules are based on the premise that each Applicant will cooperate with the utility in an effort to keep the cost of construction and installation of the underground electric distribution system as low as possible and make satisfactory arrangements for the payment of the above charges prior to the installation of the facilities.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

A. General

1. SCOPE

This Schedule of Rules and Regulations is a part of all contracts for receiving electric service from the Cooperative and applies to all service received from the Cooperative whether the service received is based upon a contract, agreement, signed application, or otherwise. No employee or individual director of the Cooperative is permitted to make an exception to rates or Rules and Regulations. Rates and service information can be obtained from the Cooperative's office.

2. REVISIONS

These Rules and Regulations may be revised, amended, supplemented or otherwise changed from time to time without notice. Such changes when effective shall have the same force as the present Rules and Regulations. The members shall be informed of any changes as soon as possible, after adoption by the Board of Directors, through the Cooperative's monthly newsletter.

3. CONSUMER'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR COOPERATIVE'S PROPERTY

All meters, service connections, and other equipment furnished by the Cooperative shall be, and remain, the property of the Cooperative. The member shall exercise proper care to protect the property of the Cooperative on its premises and in the event of loss or damage to the Cooperative's property arising from neglect of member to care for same, the cost of necessary repairs or replacement shall be paid by the member.

4. CONTINUITY OF SERVICE

The Cooperative shall use reasonable diligence to provide a constant and uninterrupted supply of electric power and energy, but if such supply shall fail or be interrupted or become defective through act of God, or the public enemy, or by accident, strikes, labor troubles, or by action of the elements, or inability to secure rights-of-way or other permits needed, or for any other cause beyond the reasonable control of the Cooperative, the Cooperative shall not be liable therefor.

5. RELOCATION OF LINES BY REQUEST OF MEMBERS

The Cooperative's established lines will not be relocated unless the expense for moving and relocating is paid by the member, except in instances where it would be to the advantage of the Cooperative to make such relocation.

6. SERVICES PERFORMED FOR MEMBERS

The Cooperative's personnel is prohibited from making repairs or performing services to the members' equipment or property except in cases of emergency or to protect the public or members' person or property. When such emergency services are performed, the member shall be charged for such service at the rate of time and material.

B. Service Procedures

7. APPLICATION FOR SERVICE

Each prospective member desiring electric service will be required to sign the Cooperative's form, "Application for Membership and For Electric Service," before service is supplied by the Cooperative and provide the Cooperative with necessary easements or right-of-way permits.

8. MEMBERSHIP FEE

The membership fee in the Corporation shall be \$10.00 (Ten Dollars). One membership must be held in connection with each separate or non-contiguous property for which service is taken and for each different class of service desired; provided, however, that commercial and residential service may be obtained upon one membership if the commercial activity is carried on in the residence of the owner. The membership fee will be refunded if all bills are paid or applied against any unpaid bills of the member at the time service is discontinued, which will automatically terminate the membership. Service covered by each membership shall be metered and billed separately.

9. RIGHT OF ACCESS

The Cooperative's identified employees shall have access to member's premises at all reasonable times for the purpose of reading meter, testing, repairing, removing, or exchanging any and all equipment belonging to the Cooperative.

10. MEMBER'S DISCONTINUANCE OF SERVICE

Any member desiring service discontinued or changed from one location to another shall give the Cooperative three (3) days' notice in person or in writing provided such notice does not violate contractual obligations.

11. RECONNECTION CHARGES

The Cooperative will make no charge for connecting service to the member's premises for the initial installation of service. When service has been terminated or when service is transferred to a new member, the Cooperative's representative shall read the meter at such premises and secure necessary application for service from the new occupant. A service charge of \$2.00 (Two Dollars) will be made to new occupant for the reconnecting or transferring of such service. Service charge will be due and payable at time of connection or transfer or upon notice of said charge. No meters shall be installed or reinstalled after working hours unless in the judgment of the Manager there exists circumstances that will justify the additional expense.

12. RESALE OF POWER BY MEMBERS

All purchased electric service used on the premises of the member shall be supplied exclusively by the Cooperative, and the member shall not directly or indirectly sell, sublet, or otherwise dispose of the electric service or any part thereof.

13. SERVICE CHARGE

All service calls made by the Cooperative pertaining to the Consumer's premises shall be charged at the rate of \$2.00 (Two Dollars) per call if such service is performed within the regular working hours of the Cooperative's employee. If call for such service is made outside the normal working hours of the Cooperative, holidays or Sunday, a charge of \$2.00 (Two Dollars) will be made to the member's account for such a call. Said charges are due and payable upon notice of such charge.

14. SERVICE CHARGE FOR TEMPORARY SERVICE

Consumers requiring temporary service (except those qualifying under Rate Schedule T) may be required to pay all costs of connecting and disconnecting incidental to the supplying and removing of service. In addition to this, a deposit will be required to cover estimated consumption of electricity. Both fees will be paid in advance. Any balance remaining at the end of temporary service will be refunded. This rule applies to carnivals, fairs, house trailers and the like.

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From modification of Administrative Order No. 5 (Public Service Commission) dated January 14, 1957:

The Commission, having considered the application and other evidence of record, is of the opinion and so finds:

(1) That any modification of Administrative Order No. 5 as requested by the applicant would also affect all electric, gas and water utilities subject to the jurisdiction of the Commission.

(2) That the Commission's Rules should be modified to permit electric, gas and water utilities to make a reasonable charge for reconnecting the customer's service provided that such charges do not exceed the average cost of rendering service and charges are given due consideration in the light of the utility's earnings.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED That the Commission's Rule No. 9, captioned Customer's Discontinuance of Service, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

(a) Any customer desiring service discontinued or changed from one address to another shall give the utility three days' notice in person or in writing, provided such notice does not violate contractual obligations.

(b) Upon request that service be reconnected at any premises subsequent to the initial installation or connection to its service lines, the utility may, subject to Paragraph (c), charge the applicant an amount not to exceed the actual average cost of making such reconnection.

(c) Any utility desiring to establish a reconnection charge under the provisions of Paragraph (b) above, shall submit for Commission approval a formal application setting out (1) the actual average cost of making such reconnections and (2) the effect of such charges on the utility's revenues.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED That Rule 22, Service Connections (Electric), be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

(a) The utility shall furnish a service drop and connect its line with the customer's service outlet except that when the distance from the utility's last support and the customer's service outlet is too great for the service wires to extend from the last support to the service outlet in one span, or when the customer's outlet for any reason is inaccessible to the utility, the cost of such special construction as may be found necessary shall be borne by the customer. The customer may require the utility to furnish at its expense an amount of wire, labor and material equivalent to that furnished for a like service connection not requiring such special construction.

(b) In no case shall a utility furnishing alternating current charge a customer for transforming equipment, unless the charge so made is by mutual agreement to provide for special conditions of service or contract or to furnish a voltage other than the standard secondary distribution voltage established by the utility.

(c) Underground service requirements and regulations shall be established by each utility having such class of service facilities and shall be filed with the Commission at the Commission's request for its approval and comments.

(d) All equipment and material furnished by the utility at its own expense shall remain the property of the utility and may be removed by it at any reasonable time after the discontinuance of service.

(e) Where any unusual conditions exist or under the provisions of the Commission's general Rule No. 9, any utility may apply to the Commission to be relieved in part of the requirements of this Rule.

15. MEMBER SERVICE EXTENSIONS

It is the desire and intention of the Cooperative to make central station service available to all persons and property within the Cooperative's operating area consistent with sound economy and good management. To accomplish this intention, the following schedule of monthly minimum bills and minimum contract periods for constructing single phase extensions and connecting members along existing lines shall apply and remain in effect for a period of five (5) years after date of energizing the extension:

0 - 1000 ft.....\$2.50	1700 - 1800 ft.....\$4.50
1000 - 1100 ft..... 2.75	1800 - 1900 ft..... 4.75
1100 - 1200 ft..... 3.00	1900 - 2000 ft..... 5.00
1200 - 1300 ft..... 3.25	2000 - 2100 ft..... 5.25
1300 - 1400 ft..... 3.50	2100 - 2200 ft..... 5.50
1400 - 1500 ft..... 3.75	2200 - 2300 ft..... 5.75

1600 - 1700 ft..... 4.25	2400 ft. and over 25¢ per additional 100 ft.

Payment of an increased monthly minimum shall entitle the consumer in all cases to the use of the number of kilowatt-hours corresponding to the minimum charge in accordance with the appropriate rate schedule.

Any single or three phase extension that is questionable in the sense that it might be temporary, such as mines, oil wells, etc., the Consumer is required to pay for construction of line and is given credit for 20% of each monthly power bill until the cost of the line is refunded. Should the Consumer cease operations, he forfeits the remainder of his deposit.

The owner shall execute a special contract stating minimum monthly bill, tenure of contract and any other special conditions, and if of questionable duration, may be secured by real estate mortgage or other acceptable security. After five (5) years the minimum shall revert to the basic minimum of the rate schedule under which the member is being billed.

On extensions where higher minimums have been established, the minimum shall be adjusted in consideration of new members added, provided the additions of the new members will reduce the minimum bill rate.

will, at its own expense, make periodical tests and inspections of its meters in order to maintain a high standard of accuracy and to conform with the regulations of the Public Service Commission. The Cooperative will make additional tests of meters at the request of the member, provided the member does not request such test more frequently than once in twelve (12) months and upon payment of a fee of \$2.00 (Two Dollars) paid in advance. When the test made at the member's request shows that the meter is accurate within 2% slow or fast, no adjustment will be made to the member's bill and the fee paid will be forfeited to cover cost of requested test. When the test shows the meter to be in excess of 2% fast or slow, an adjustment shall be made to the member's bill by recalculating the monthly bills for a period equal to one-half (1/2) of the time lapsed since the last previous test, but in no case shall this period exceed three (3) months and the cost of testing the meter found to be inaccurate will be borne by the Cooperative and the \$2.00 (Two Dollars) fee paid by the member will be refunded.

17. FAILURE OF METER TO REGISTER

In the event a member's meter should fail to register, the member shall be billed from the date of such failure at the average consumption of the member based on the three (3) month period immediately preceding the failure.

18. DISCONTINUANCE OF SERVICE BY COOPERATIVE

The Cooperative may refuse to connect or discontinue service to a member for the violation of any of its rules and regulations. The Cooperative may discontinue service to a member for the theft of current or the appearance of current-theft devices on the premises of the member. The discontinuance of service by the Cooperative for any cause stated in this rule does not release the member of his obligation of all bills due.

D. Consumer Equipment

19. POINT OF DELIVERY

The point of delivery is the point as designated by the Cooperative on member's premises where current is to be delivered to building or premises namely the meter. All wiring and equipment beyond this point of delivery shall be supplied and maintained by the member. The member will, however, notify the Cooperative of any proposed changes in his equipment or wiring which will materially increase or decrease his load so the Cooperative may check its equipment to make certain it will accommodate the consumer's load requirement.

20. CONSUMER'S WIRING

All wiring of the member must conform to Cooperative's requirements and accepted

modern standards. The member agrees to construct its facilities in accordance with specifications at least equal to those prescribed by the National Electric Safety Code and the Bureau of Standards. The Cooperative, however, assumes no responsibility in respect to the type, standard of construction, protective equipment or the condition of the member's property, and will not be liable for any loss or injury to persons or property occurring on the premises or property of the member. The member agrees to operate and maintain its facilities so as not to interfere with the service of the Cooperative to its other members. The member will have complete responsibility for all construction, operation, and maintenance beyond the meter and will save the Cooperative harmless against liability for injury or damages resulting in any manner from construction, location, operation, or maintenance of the member's facilities. The minimum wiring requirements acceptable by the Cooperative are as follows:

1. EXISTING HOUSES NOT PREVIOUSLY WIRED

- A. Size of service entrance conductors and main fuse panel to be determined by the proposed load and conditions set forth in the National Electric Code.
- B. Sixty (60) ampere main and range fuse panel and three (3) #6 service entrance conductors will be the MINIMUM requirements.
- C. Thirty (30) ampere fuse panel will not be approved for the main service for any dwelling or business.
- D. All rooms must be wired. Every room and basement must have one (1) or more receptacles.
- E. Two-inch rigid conduit will be the MINIMUM requirement where service entrance conduit is used for a riser.
- F. Check at Cooperative Office for information not covered above.
- G. Any deviation from the above requirements must be approved by the Manager of the Cooperative.

2. NEW HOUSE CONSTRUCTION

- A. Size of service entrance conductors and main fuse panel to be determined by the proposed load and conditions as set forth in the National Electric Code.
- B. MINIMUM size service entrance conductors will be three (3) #2R or

three (3) #3RH conductors or service entrance cable with a 100 ampere main fuse disconnect.

- C. EXCEPTION - In any house, three rooms or less, three (3) #6 entrance conductors with a sixty (60) ampere main and range panel may be used.
- D. Where two-inch rigid conduit is used for the riser, the bolts for the support of the conduit must go through the brick, stone, or the sheathing and fastened through the studs or the header. Two eye clamps with set screw must be used and placed approximately 12" above the meter base and 12" below the eaves or cornice. Meter base to be fastened with lead tamps, expanders, toggle or wing bolts.
- E. Duplex receptacles to be installed in accordance with the National Electric Code, Par. 2124, Sub. Par. B. (One duplex receptacle for each 20 ft. of lineal wall space or fraction thereof.
- F. Basement receptacle will be of the approved GROUNDED type and grounding conductor to originate at main fuse panel.
- G. Check with the Cooperative Office for information not covered above.
- H. Any deviation from the above requirements must be approved by the Manager of the Cooperative.

3. METER POLE INSTALLATION

- A. All meter pole installations must be provided with a main fuse switch or circuit breaker mounted below the meter, having capacity of the total diversified load which the meter pole will serve. The meter loop assembly will be supplied by the consumer and the Cooperative will furnish the service pole.
- B. All installations and wiring of the meter pole must meet National Electric Code and REA requirements.

4. SPECIAL CONDITIONS

- A. All new houses or buildings must have a rough-in and final inspection. All existing houses being wired must have final inspection.
- B. All electric water heaters must be connected with two-fuse disconnect and be provided with apparatus ground.

- C. City water piping system must be used for service grounding when available plus standard driven ground. (Watch for plastic pipe.)
- D. All grounds other than the water system are to be of 3/4" galvanized water pipe equipped with a driving point.
- E. Any deviations from above requirements must be approved by the Manager of the Cooperative.

5. SERVICE TO HOUSE TRAILER

- A. To secure service for a house trailer, a satisfactory contract must be negotiated between the Cooperative and the person requesting service before any installation is made.
- B. A 25' Class 7 creosote pole set at least 5 ft. in the ground must be located near the trailer.
- C. Pole must have the following equipment:
Weather head with two (2) wire #8 entrance cable to meter base with a thirty (30) ampere weatherproof fuse disconnect box for 120-volt service.

For 240-volt service, three (3) wire #6 entrance cable with a sixty (60) ampere weatherproof box must be used.

Regular house grounding rules must be followed. Ground wire must be carried back up pole to weather head. Trailer body must be grounded.
- D. Inspection is required on meter poles for service to house trailer.

21. INSPECTION

All consumers' wiring must be inspected for compliance with the National Electric Code by an inspector approved by the Cooperative before connection for service by the Cooperative. Fee for such inspection shall be paid at the Cooperative's Office.

When any of the employees of the Cooperative have notice or observe that the wiring in any building, to which electric energy is served by the Cooperative, is in a condition so as to be dangerous to persons or property, such employee shall immediately notify the Manager of the Cooperative of such dangerous condition. If the Manager upon investigation determines that such dangerous

condition exists, he may at once have the service to the building where such condition exists discontinued and service shall not be restored to said premises until said building has been rewired and inspected and the certificate of the inspector certifies that the wiring in said building complies with all the rules and regulations of the National Electric Code of the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Unless said certificate is furnished, no service of electric energy shall be supplied to the said building or to the premises.

B. Electric Bills

22. BILLING

Members will receive statements for electric service on the fifth day of each month for service rendered for a thirty-day period ending the fifteenth of the preceding month. All statements are due and payable upon receipt and shall be paid at the office of the Cooperative within ten (10) days from date of bill. Failure to receive electrical statement will not release the member from payment obligation. Should the statement not be paid as above, the Cooperative may at any time thereafter on a five (5) days' notice to the member discontinue service. Should it become necessary for the Cooperative's representative to call at the Consumer's premises or other locations for the purpose of collecting a delinquent account, a charge of \$2.00 (Two Dollars) will be made to the member's account for the extra service rendered, due and payable at time such delinquent account is collected. If service is disconnected for non-payment, an additional charge of \$2.00 (Two Dollars) will be made for reconnecting service due and payable at time of such reconnection.

23. METER READING

Each member receiving service will be required to supply the Cooperative with the reading of each meter on the form as furnished by the Cooperative, on such date as designated by the Cooperative. Upon failure by the member to supply the Cooperative with such meter reading for three (3) consecutive meter reading dates, the Cooperative shall act by having its representative read the member's meter and a service charge of \$2.00 (Two Dollars) will be made for the extra service rendered. The service charge will be made to the member's account and will be due and payable upon notice of said charge. In the event that an error in meter reading should be made or member fails to send in meter-reading card, the member shall pay for that month either the minimum bill for the service which he receives or, if he should be a large user, he shall pay an amount approximately equal to his average bill. Then the following month his bill shall be computed on the regular schedule prorated for two months and the amount paid shall be credited.

24. UNPAID CHECKS FROM CONSUMERS (Cont.)

When a check received in payment of a consumer's account is returned unpaid by the bank for any reason, the Cooperative will notify such consumer by letter stating the amount of the check and the reason for its return. Returned checks will be considered same as a delinquent account, and, if payment in full is not received for check within five (5) days after notice, service to such consumer will be discontinued as prescribed under that section of Rule 22 dealing with unpaid accounts.

25. BILLING ADJUSTED TO STANDARD PERIODS

In case of the first billing of a new account and the final billing of an account where the period covered by the billing is a fraction of a month, the demand charge and/or the energy used will be prorated for proportional part of the billing period when computing such bill.

26. DEPOSITS

A deposit or suitable guarantee approximately equal to two times the average monthly bill may be required of any member before service is supplied if the Cooperative deems it necessary to insure payment for the service it will render. The Cooperative may at its own option return the deposit after six (6) months. Upon termination of service, deposit may be applied against unpaid bills of the member, and, if any balance remains after such application is made, said balance to be refunded to the member.

F. Classification of Consumers

27. PURPOSE OF CLASSIFICATION

Classification is a means for treating without discrimination. All members having similar characteristics in their use of service. Special classification will be avoided unless surrounding conditions are so unusual that to apply one of the existing rates or rules would result in serious injustice to either the particular member or to all other members.

28. FARM CONSUMER

A farm is any operating unit consisting of three acres or more and annually producing agricultural products, exclusive of home garden, with a value of \$150.00 (One Hundred and Fifty Dollars) or more; or a farming unit of less than three (3) acres with a value of agricultural products sold amounting to \$150.00 (One Hundred and Fifty Dollars) or more. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under Rate Schedule "A-1" or "A-WH".

29. NON-FARM RESIDENTIAL CONSUMER

A non-farm residential consumer shall be any residential consumer not qualifying as an operating unit under Rule 28. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under Rate Schedule "A-1" or "A-WH".

30. COMMERCIAL CONSUMER

A commercial consumer will be any business establishment such as a store, office, garage, tavern, creamery, factory, hotel, tourist cabin resort, or institution other than schools, churches, or community halls. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under Rate Schedule "B", "LP", or "OPS".

31. RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENT OCCUPYING SAME PREMISES DESIRING SERVICE THROUGH A SINGLE METER

A member operating a commercial establishment on the same premises as his residence may be served through a single meter and shall be classified as a commercial consumer. If, however, the consumer prefers, it is not necessary for him to take all of his service under the commercial rate. Instead, the business establishment may be served under the commercial rate and his residence served under the farm and home rate. In this case, two (2) meter will be required.

32. PROCESSING OF FARM PRODUCTS

If the processing of farm products is done on the consumer's farm and is applied to farm products raised principally by the consumer, he shall be classified as a farm consumer; otherwise, he shall be classified as a commercial consumer.

33. LARGE POWER CONSUMER

A large power consumer will generally be recognized as a commercial or power consumer requiring more than 25 KVA of transformer capacity. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall have the option of being billed under Rate Schedule "OPS" or "LP". Terms and conditions for serving large power consumers shall be determined individually.

34. SEASONAL RESIDENTIAL CONSUMER

A seasonal residential consumer shall be classified as any non-farm residential consumer who normally uses electric service for a house or cabin for a fractional part of a year. Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under Rate Schedule "A-1" or "A-WH".

35. SERVICE TO SCHOOLS, CHURCHES AND COMMUNITY HALLS

The special rates available to these small institutions shall be limited to 5 KVA of transformer capacity. Conditions of Service

1. The consumer shall install and operate in regular use a standard approved storage type of electric water heater and shall have no non-electric household water heating device in use during any part of the year (such as heating coils in a fuel-burning range or furnace).
2. Regardless of number of storage type water heaters connected to any single service only one block of 300 kwh per month at 1.1¢ per kwh will be allowed for any single service.
3. The standard approved type of water heater shall consist of an insulated tank containing two thermostatically controlled, non-inductive heating elements, so connected that only one element is permitted to operate any time. The capacity of the tank shall be sufficient to furnish an ample supply of hot water but in no case shall it be less than 30 gallons. The wattage of the heating elements shall not exceed 20 watts per gallon of tank capacity for the lower element and 30 watts per gallon for the upper element, rounded off to the nearest commercial sizes of elements. The entire installation shall be subject to the approval of the cooperative including the insulation and size of the tank, the wiring and the size of the heating elements.
4. Provision shall be made in the consumer's water-heater wiring installation for an automatic control device which the cooperative may install at its discretion.

Determination of Billing Demand

The billing demand shall be the maximum kilowatt demand established by the consumer for any period of fifteen consecutive minutes during the month for which the bill is rendered, as indicated or recorded by a demand meter and adjusted for power factor as provided hereafter.

Power Factor Adjustment

The consumer agrees to maintain unity power factor as nearly as practicable. Demand charges will be adjusted for consumers with 50 KW or more of measured demand to correct for average power factors lower than 90%, and may be so adjusted for other consumers if and when the Seller deems necessary. Such adjustments will be made by increasing the measured demand 1% for each 1% by which the average power factor is less than 90% lagging.

Minimum Monthly Charge

The minimum monthly charge under the above rate shall be \$1.50 where 3 KVA or less of transformer capacity is required. For consumers requiring more than 3 KVA of transformer capacity the minimum monthly charge shall be increased by 75¢ for each additional KVA or fraction thereof required. Where it is necessary to extend or re-enforce existing distribution facilities, the minimum monthly charge may be increased to assure adequate compensation for the added facilities. Where the minimum charge is increased in accordance with the terms of this section, additional energy and demand shall be included in accordance with the foregoing rate schedule.

Minimum Annual Charge for Seasonal Service

Consumers requiring service only during certain seasons not exceeding 9 months per year may guarantee a minimum annual charge, in which case there shall be no minimum monthly charge. The minimum annual charge shall be sufficient to assure adequate compensation for the facilities installed to serve the Consumer, and in no event shall it be less than twelve times the minimum monthly charge determined in accordance with the foregoing paragraph.

Service at Primary Voltage

If the Association is unable to obtain a loan from the Rural Electrification Administration to finance the construction of such a project, the Applicant agrees that only so much of the ~~\$5.00~~^{\$10.00} as has not been expended for development expenses will be returned to him. If the Association succeeds in establishing a rural electrification project but is unable to furnish service to the Applicant, the sum of ~~\$5.00~~^{\$10.00} will be returned to the Applicant.

2. The Applicant will, when electric energy becomes available and the meter installed, purchase from the Association all electric energy used on the premises described below and will pay therefor monthly at the rates which will be fixed by the Board of Directors of the Association. The Applicant will pay a minimum of \$2.50 per month which will entitle him to the use of not more than 30 kilowatt hours.

(d) Consumers having their homes on the same premises with their business establishments may include service to both on the same meter, in which case all service will be billed under this schedule, using the rate set out above. If the consumer prefers, he may make provisions for two meters, in which case his usage for residential purposes will be billed under the appropriate residential schedule, and his usage for business purposes will be billed under this schedule.

(e) The rated capacity of single-phase motors shall not be in excess of ten horsepower (10 H.P.).

(f) Motors having a rated capacity in excess of ten horsepower (10 H.P.) must be three-phase.
