RULES AND REGULATIONS

A. General.

. l. SCOPE

This schedule of Rules and Regulations is a part of all contracts for receiving electric service from the Cooperative and applies to all service received from the Cooperative whether the service received is based upon a contract, agreement, signed application, or otherwise. No employee or individual director of the Cooperative is permitted to make an exception to rates or Rules and Regulations. Rates and service information can be obtained from the Cooperative's office.

2. REVISIONS

These Rules and Regulations may be revised, amended, supplemented, or otherwise changed from time to time without notice. Such changes when effective shall have the same force as the present Rules and Regulations. The members shall be informed of any changes as soon as possible after adoption by the Board of Directors, through the Cooperative's monthly newsletter.

3. CONSUMER'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR COOPERATIVE'S PROPERTY

All meters, service connections, and other equipment furnished by the Cooperative shall be and remain, the property of the Cooperative. The member shall exercise proper care to protect the property of the Cooperative on its premises and in the event of loss or damage to the Cooperative's property arising from neglect of member to care for same, the cost of necessary repairs or replacement shall be paid by the member.

4. CONTINUITY OF SERVICE

The Cooperative shall use reasonable diligence to provide a constant and uninterrupted supply of electric power and energy, but if such supply shall fail or be interrupted or become defective through act of God, or the public enemy, or by accident, strikes, labor troubles, or any action of the elements, or inability to secure rights-of-way or other permits needed, or for any other cause beyond the reasonable control of the Cooperative, the Cooperative shall not be liable therefor.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

RELOCATION OF LINES BY REQUEST OF MEMBERS 5.

The Cooperative's established lines will not be relocated unless the expense for moving and relocating is paid by the member, except in instances where it would be to the advantage of Cooperative to make such relocation.

SERVICES PERFORMED FOR MEMBERS

The Cooperative's personnel is prohibited from making repairs or performing services to the members equipment or property except in cases of emergency or to protect the public or member's person or property. When such emergency services are performed, the member shall be charged for such service at the rate of time and material.

SERVICE PROCEDURES

APPLICATION FOR SERVICE

Each prospective member desiring electric service will be required to sign the Cooperative's form, "Application for Membership and for Electric Service," before service is supplied by the Cooperative and provide the Cooperative with necessary easements or right-of-way permits.

MEMBERSHIP FEE

The membership fee in the Corporation shall be five (\$5.00) dollars. One membership must be held in connection with each member receiving service. The membership fee will be refunded if all bills are paid or applied against any unpaid bills of the member at the time service is discontinued which will automatically terminate the membership. Service covered by each membership shall be metered and billed separately.



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RULES AND REGULATIONS

DEPOSITS TO GUARANTEE PAYMENT OF BILLS

In accordance with the rules and regulations of the Public Service Commission, the Nolin Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation hereby adopts the following policy concerning the requirement of deposits to be placed with the Cooperative when application is made for service:

- Each consumer or applicant for service shall provide a minimum cash deposit or other guaranty to secure payment of their electrical bill, and this deposit shall be in an amount not to exceed 2/12 of the estimated annual bill for that service.
- The Cooperative may, at its option, return the deposit to the consumer after 3 years, or sooner if service is terminated prior to 3 years.
- Interest will be paid on such deposit at the rate of 6% per annum by a credit in December of each year to the members account the amount due for interest.
- Upon termination of service the deposit and any accrued interest may be applied against any unpaid bills of the member, and if any balance remains after such application is made, said balance will be paid to the member.
- The Cooperative will issue to every member from whom a deposit is received a certificate of deposit, showing the name of the member, location of initial premises occupied, date and amount of the deposit.
- In figuring the amount of the 2/12 estimated annual bill, the deposit shall be computed from previous billings on that service or estimated from calculations of potential use, taking into consideration the appliances to be used by the consumer.
- Adjustments in the amount of the deposit may be made, at the option of the Cooperative, after the first year of service to comply with the 2/12 deposit requirement.
- Deposits shall be required from all consumers or applicants who do not have a previous, satisfactory credit history established with the Cooperative. Public Service Commission

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

15. DISCONTINUANCE OF SERVICE

- A. The Cooperative may refuse or discontinue service to any applicant or member under the following conditions and after the proper written notice of such intention is mailed to the last known address.
- 1. For non-compliance with its rules and regulations, or state, municipal or other codes rules and regulations applying to such service.
- 2. When an applicant or member refuses or neglects to provide a reasonable access to the premises for the purpose of installation, operation, meter reading, maintenance or removal of Cooperative property.
- B. For fraudulent or illegal use of service, the service to the member may be discontinued without notice. The cooperative shall not restore service until the member has complied with all rules of the Cooperative and regulations of the commission and reimbursed the Cooperative for the estimated amount of the service rendered and the cost as incurred by reason of the fraudulent use.
- C. When a dangerous condition is found to exist on the applicants or members premises, the service shall be cut off without notice or refused. The Cooperative shall notify the applicant or member immediately of the reasons for discontinuance or refusal and corrective action taken by the applicant or member before service can be restored.
- D. For non-payment of bills, refer to sheet no. 9 Section 23 Billing.

16. SERVICE CHARGE FOR TEMPORARY SERVICE.

- 1. No charges will be made to furnish temporary single phase service to permanent dwellings and businesses during construction, providing that the applicant meets all other requirements under the rules and regulations.
- 2. Applicants requiring temporary service which will not be permanently served will be required to pay all costs of construction and removal incidental to supplying electric service.
- 3. In addition to paragraph 2, a payment will be required to cover estimated consumption of electricity. This amount shall be adjusted to actual usage, by refund or additional billing when removed.
- 4. Both fees shall be paid in advance.
- 5. This rule applies to fairs, carnivals, circuses, construction of sites and any other location of a strictly temporary Englished Commission

17. CONSUMERS WIRING

All consumers wiring shall comply with the rules and regulations of the National Electric Code, Energy Regulatory Commission, the Cooperative State and Local Codes.

| · . | a. Underground ditch shall be dug to a depth of at least forty (40") inches from final grade. Service wire shall be covered with sand 6 inches on top and 4 inches on the bottom or enclosed in metal conduit, PVC or 4 inch non-perforated plastic drainage tile. |

- b. The use of aluminum conductors within residences, service entrances, farm buildings, meter poles and commercial installations is prohibited due to the inexperience of electricians and lack of the proper tools for installing.
- c. Outside weatherproof overhead aluminum and underground . aluminum conductors are acceptable.
- d. Weatherheads and eye bolt attachments shall be twelve (12') feet above final grade minimum and not more than thirty (30') feet maximum.
- 9. Commercial and Industrial Final Inspections
 - a. All wiring and installation of disconnect panels and service entrance equipment to be completed.
 - b. All permanent fixtures, appliances, motors, heaters and air conditioning units shall be installed.
- 10. Emergency Connects may be made due to the lack of installation of a major appliance or seasonal equipment beyond the builders control. Provided that all other wiring is approved and provisions are made for the equipment and is in a safe condition, reinspection fee is paid and certificate for re-inspection is signed by owner, electrician and builder.
- 11. Consumers may request wiring inspection without charge if wiring conditions warrant a need for the inspection or in case of a serious or dangerous condition is found and to assist consumers in investigation of high bills.
- 12. Information on electric heat, underground and special installations are listed under separate titled requirements.

19. SERVICE CONNECTION

The Cooperative shall furnish without charge a service drop to the nearest point closest to the existing line. When the consumers outlet is inaccessible, or the consumer desires that the service outlet be in a location other than the closest to the Cooperatives lines the cost of such special construction shall be borne by the consumer. The distance from closest lines to nearest point of attachment shall then be substracted from the special construction distance, and the consumer shall pay for the difference. This applies to both overhead and underground services. Approval shall be obtained from the Cooperative as to the proper location.

C. METERS

20. METER TEST

All new meters shall be checked for accuracy before installation. The Cooperative will, at its own expense, make periodical test and inspections of its meters in order to maintain a high standard of accuracy and to conform with the regulations of the Public Service Commission.

The Cooperative will make additional test of meters at the request of the member and upon an advance payment of a ten (\$10.00) dollar fee. When the test shows the meter to be in excess of 2% fast, an adjustment shall be made to the members bill by recalculating the monthly bills for that period of time that it is known to be fast. In the event the period of time is not known, then a period equal to one half (1/2) of the elapsed time since the last previous test but in no case to exceed twelve (12) months, except that if time for the periodic test has over run, then the time of over run shall be added to the amount unless it can be shown that the failure to make the periodic test was due to cause beyond the control of the Cooperative. The cost of testing the meter found to be inaccurate will be borne by the Cooperative and the ten (\$10.00) dollar fee paid by the member will be refunded.

21. FAILURE OF METER TO REGISTER

In the event a member's meter should fail to register, the member shall be billed from the date of such failure at the average consumption of the member based on the three (3) month period immediately preceding the failure.

22. METER READING

Each member receiving service will be required to supply the Cooperative with reading of each meter on the form as furnished by the Cooperative on such date designated by the Cooperative. Upon failure by the member to supply the Cooperative with such meter reading for three (3) consecutive meter reading dates the Cooperative will act by having its representative read the member's meter, and a service charge of ten (\$10.00) dollars will be made for the extra service rendered. The service charge will be made to the member's account and will be due and payable upon notice of said charge. In the event that an error in meter reading should be made or member fails to send in meter reading card, the member shall pay for that month either the minimum bill for the service which he receives, or if he should be a larger user, he shall pay an amount approximately equal to his average bill, then the following month his bill shall be computed on the regular schedule prorated for two months and the amount paid shall be credited.

23. BILLING

Members will receive statements for electric service on or about the first of each month for service rendered for a thirty day period ending the 1st day of the preceding month. All statements are due and payable upon receipt and shall be paid at the office of the Cooperative within ten (10) days from date of bill. Failure to receive electrical statement will not release the member from payment obligation. Should the statement not be paid as above the Cooperative may at any time thereafter on a ten (10) days' notice to the member discontinue service provided such service shall not be discontinued before twenty-seven (27) days after the mailing date of the original bill. Should it become necessary for the Cooperative's representative to call at the Consumer's premises or other locations for the purpose of collecting a service of the purpose of collecting and the purpose of collecting a service of the purpose of the purpose of the purpose of t

delinquent account, a charge of ten (\$10.00) dollars will be made to the member's account for the extra service rendered, due and payable at the time such delinquent account is collected. If service is disconnected for non-payment, an additional charge of ten (\$10.00) dollars will be made for reconnecting service due and payable at time of such reconnection.

24. BILLING ADJUSTED TO STANDARD PERIODS

In case of the first billing of a new account and the final billing of an account where the period covered by the billing is a fraction of a month, the charges for energy and rural lights, used will be prorated for proportional part of the billing period when computing such bill.

25. TAXES

The Cooperative shall add to the bills of all applicable members the Kentucky Sales and Use tax, any Utility gross receipt license tax for schools, and any other tax that may be imposed on the Cooperative that is measured or determined by sales or receipts.

UNPAID CHECKS FROM CONSUMERS

When a check received in payment of a consumers account is returned unpaid by the bank for any reason, the Cooperative will notify such consumer by form letter, notice of returned check stating the amount of check and reason for its return. Returned checks will then be considered the same as a delinquent account, and if payment in full is not received for check within ten (10) business days after notice, service to the consumer will be discontinued, provided such service shall not be discontinued before twenty-seven (27) days after mailing date of original bill which such returned check was intended to pay, as prescribed under that section of rule 23 dealing within unpaid Ten (\$10.00) dollars service charge shall be added to all accounts. returned unhonored checks. The Cooperative shall have the right to refuse to accept checks in payment of an account from any consumer that has demonstrated poor credit risk by having two or more checks returned unpaid from a bank for any reason. The Cooperative shall not accept a check to pay for and redeem another check or accept a two party check for cash or payment of an account.

E. CLASSIFICATION

27. PURPOSE OF CLASSIFICATION

Classification is a means for treating without discrimination all members having similiar characteristics in their use of service.

28. RESIDENTIAL, FARM, NON-FARM, TRAILER AND MOBILE HOMES

Consumers qualifying under this classification shall be billed under rate schedule 1. Available to all residents for all uses in the home or on the farm including trailers, mobile homes, schools, churches, community halls and non-profit community welfare institutions, where the required total transformer capacity is 50 KVA or less, single phase or three phase where available at available voltages.

Applications to serve trailers and mobile homes are required to comply with the trailer and mobile home policy.

Applications for service to barns, silos, water and irrigation pumps or to other buildings not classified as residential or commercial are required to comply with the cooperatives rules and regulations.

Applications for three phase service shall be required to sign a five (5) year contract to pay not less than the computed minimum bill for five (5) years.

29. COMMERCIAL, SMALL POWER, SINGLE AND THREE PHASE SERVICE

A commercial consumer will be any business, place of trade, place for the use of the general public, private club, and advertising signs. If more than 50 KVA of transformer capacity is required, any school, church, community hall and small non-profit community welfare institution shall be included.

TYPE OF SERVICE: Single phase, 120/240 volts, 60 cycles, transformer capacity of 50 KVA or less.

RATES: As listed under Schedule 1, Residential, Farm, Non-Farm, Trailers and Mobile Homes.

Pursuant to the rules of 807 KAR 50:065 Section 11. CONDITIONS: Distribution Line Extensions to Mobile Homes.

- All extensions of up to 150 feet from the nearest facility shall be made without charge.
- Extensions greater than 150 feet and up to 300 feet shall be made provided the consumer pays in advance a "Consumer Advance for Construction" of fifty (\$50.00) dollars in addition to any other charges required by the Cooperative of all consumers.
- This advance shall be refunded at the end of one (1) year if the service continues for that length of time.
- For extensions greater than 300 feet and less than 1000 feet from the nearest facility the "Consumer Advance for Construction" shall be made at the rate of \$2.60 per foot plus fifty (\$50.00) dollars.
- Beyond 1000 feet extensions the "Consumer Advance for Construction" shall be made at the rate of \$2.60 per foot plus fifty (\$50.00) dollars.
- The cost of service and transformers is not included in any "Consumer Advance for Construction" for mobile homes.
- The "Consumer Advance for Construction" Par. 4, for extensions 300 feet to 1000 feet and par. 5, beyond 1000 feet shall be refunded over a four (4) year period in equal amounts for each year the service is continued.
- If the service is discontinued for a period of sixty (60) days, or should the mobile home be removed and another not take its place within sixty (60) days or be replaced by a permanent structure the remainder of the advance shall be forfeited.

No refund shall be made to any consumer who did not make the advance originally.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

33. UNDERGROUND PRIMARY AND SERVICE

A. Purpose of Policy

The purpose of this policy is to formulate Nolin RECC requirements for underground electrical service, the application of which will insure adequate service and safety to all persons engaged in the construction, maintenance, operation or use of underground facilities and to the public in general.

B. Applicability

This policy shall apply to all underground electrical supply facilities used in connection with electric service distribution in new residential subdivisions after the effective date of this policy.

C. Definitions

The following words and terms, when used in this policy, shall have the meaning indicated:

Applicant - the developer, builder or other person, partnership, association, corporation or governmental agency applying for the installation of an underground electric distribution system.

Building - a structure enclosed within exterior walls or fire walls, built, erected and framed of component structural parts and designed for one (1) family occupancy.

Multiple - Occupancy Building - a structure enclosed within exterior walls or fire walls, built, erected and framed of compenent structural parts and designed to contain two (2) or more individual dwelling units.

Distribution System - electric service facilities consisting of primary and secondary conductors, ED transformers and necessary accessories and cappund tenances for the furnishing of electric power at utilization voltage.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

33. UNDERGROUND PRIMARY AND SERVICE (Cont'd.)

Subdivision - the tract of land which is divided into ten (10) or more lots for the construction of new residential buildings, or the land on which is constructed two (2) or more new multiple occupancy buildings.

Trenching and Backfilling - opening and preparing the ditch for the installation of conductors including placing of raceways under roadways, driveways, or paved areas; providing a sand bedding below and above conductors when required; and a double backfill, the first backfill will be to a level of 18" above cable on primary voltage wires only then a strip of plastic warning tape will be installed and any telephone cables if required, then the final backfill to the top of the ditch will be completed and compacted.

D. Rights of Way and Easements

- 1. The Cooperative shall construct, own, operate and maintain distribution lines only along easements, public streets, roads and highways which are by legal right accessible to the utility's equipment and which the utility has the legal right to occupy, and on the public lands and private property across which rights of way and easements satisfactory to the Cooperative are provided without cost or condemnation by the Cooperative.
- 2. Rights of way and easements suitable to the Cooperative for the underground distribution facilities must be furnished by the Applicant in reasonable time to meet service requirements. The Applicant shall make the area in which the underground districed bution facilities are to be located accessible who commission the Cooperative's equipment, remove all obstructions from such area, (including trees and roots) Astake to show property lines and final grade, perform perform final grade, and maintain clearing and grading to a reasonable approximation of final grade, and maintain clearing and grading the Applicant and subsquent property

owners to provide continuing access to the utility for operation, maintenance or replacement of its facilities, and to prevent any encroachment in the utility's easement or substantial changes in grade or elevation thereof.

- Installation of Underground Distribution System Within New Subdivision
 - l. Where appropriate contractual arrangements have been made, the Cooperative shall install within the subdivision an underground electric distribution system of sufficient capacity and suitable materials which, in its judgment, will assure that the property owners will receive safe and adequate electric service for the foreseeable future.
 - All single-phase conductors installed by the utility shall be underground. Appurtenances such as transformers, pedestal-mounted terminals, switching equipment and meter cabinets may be placed above ground.
 - 3. Multi-phase primary mains or feeders required within a subdivision to supply local distribution or to serve individual multi-phase loads may be overhead unless underground is required by governmental authority or chosen by the Applicant, with the exception that no multi-phase feeder lines will be placed underground unless approved by the Cooperative, in either of which case the differential cost of underground shall be borne by the Applicant.
 - If the Applicant has complied with the requirements herein and has given the Cooperative notices than 120 days' written notice prior to the anticipated date of completion (i.e., ready for occupancy) of the first building in the subdivision, the Cooperative shall complete the installation 30 days prior to the estimated completion date. (Subject to weather and ground conditions and availability of materials and barring extraordinary or emergency circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the Cooperative.) However, nothing in this policy

shall be interpreted to require the Cooperative to extend service to portions of the subdivisions not under active development.

- A non-refundable payment shall be made by the Applicant equal to the difference between the cost of providing underground facilities and that of providing overhead facilities. The payment to be made by Applicant shall be determined from the total footage of single phase primary, secondary and service conductor to be installed at an average per foot cost differential in accordance with the Average Cost Differential filed herewith as Exhibit A, which Average Cost Differential shall be updated annually as required by order dated February 2, 1973 of the Public Service Commission of Kentucky in Administrative Case No. 146. (Three (3) wire secondary and service conductor runs shall be considered as one conductor, i. e. triplex.) The average cost differential per foot, as stated, is representative of construction in soil free of rock, shale, or other impairments which increase cost of construction. Where rock, shale or other impairments are anticipated or encountered in construction the actual increase cost of trenching and backfilling shall be borne by the Applicant.
- The Applicant may be required to deposit the entire estimated cost of the extension. this is done, the amount deposited in excess of the normal charge for the underground extensions, as provided in paragraph 5 above, shall be refunded to the applicant over a ten (10) year period as provided in Public Service Commission Regulation 807 KAR 2:050 Section 10.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

UNDERGROUND PRIMARY AND SERVICE (Cont'd.) 33.

- .7. The Applicant may be required to perform all necessary trenching and backfilling in accordance with the Cooperative's specifications. The Cooperative shall then credit the applicant's cost in an amount equal to the Cooperative's normal cost for trenching and backfilling.
- The Cooperative shall furnish, install and maintain the service lateral to the Applicant's meter base, which normally will be at the corner of the building nearest the point to be served.
- Plans for the location of all facilities to be installed shall be approved by the Cooperative and the Applicant prior to construction. Alternatios in plans by the Applicant which require additional cost of installation or construction shall be at the sole expense of the Applicant.
- The Cooperative shall not be obligated to install 10. any facility within a subdivision until satisfactory arrangements for the payment of charges have been completed by the Applicant.
- The charges specified in these rules are based on the premise that each Applicant will cooperate with the utility in an effort to keep the cost of construction and installation of the underground electric distribution system as low as possible and make satisfactory arrangements for the payment of the above charges prior to the installation of the facilities.
- 12. All electrical facilities shall be installed and constructed to comply with the rules and regulations of the Public Service Commission, National Electric Safety Code, Nolin RECC Specifications, or other rules and regulations which may be applicable.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

Service pedestals and method of installation shall be approved by Nolin RECC prior toppinstaldation.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

33. UNDERGROUND PRIMARY AND SERVICE (Cont'd.)

14. In unusual circumstances, when the application of these rules appears impracticable or unjust to either party, or discriminatory to other customers, the Cooperative or Applicant shall refer the matter to the Commission for a special ruling or for the approval of special conditions which may be mutually agreed upon, prior to commencing construction.



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RULES AND REGULATIONS

33. UNDERGROUND PRIMARY AND SERVICE (Cont'd.)

TYPICAL ROCK CLAUSE

An additional \$20 per linear trench foot shall be charged where extremely rocky conditions are encountered, such conditions being defined as limestone or other hard stratified material in a continuous volume of at least one cubic yard or more which cannot be removed using ordinary excavation equipment.

The \$20.00 per linear trench foot figure is used as an example only and will be increased or decreased according to current prices supplied by contractors at the time the construction is to take place.

C 34. VARIABLE BUDGET BILLING PAYMENT PLAN

- A. OBJECTIVE: To establish a procedure whereby members may pay their electric bill in monthly installments.
- B. AVAILABILITY: Available to all Nolin Rural Electric Cooperative residential members who have received service at their present location for ONE YEAR.

C. TERMS OF VARIABLE BUDGET BILLING:

- A member who qualifies may be placed on or removed from variable budget billing in any month of the year.
- 2. This is a continuous plan and there will be no account settlement (catch up) month. Variable budget accounts shall be reviewed when the account is removed from the budget plan or has been disconnected. All accumulated debits shall become due and payable at this time, or any credits accumulated shall be refunded or credited to the consumer.
- 3. Members shall accurately read the meter on the first day of each month.
- 4. Electric bills shall be paid and the reading submitted by the 10th of each month.
- 5. The Cooperative may cancel the variable budget plan for estimated readings, delinquent accounts and non-payments.

D. CALCULATIONS FOR MONTHLY BILLING:

- Each billing will be based on the past eleven (11) months kilowatt hour usage, and the current month kilowatt hours usage shall be added to provide a moving average based on twelve months kilowatt hour usage.
- 2. Each succeeding month the oldest months usage shall be dropped and the current months usage added.
- 3. Since the averages shall be based only on kilowatt hour usage, any taxes, security lights, fuel adjustment costs, and other monthly charges will be added.
- 4. Therefore, each months electric bill will not be exactly the same, and the electric bill will vary a small amount from month to month.

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35. SERVICE TO BARNS, SILOS, WATER AND IRRIGATION PUMPS

AVAILABILITY: Available to barns, silos, water and irrigation pumps, or to other buildings not classified as residential or commercial, in the Cooperatives service area subject to the rules and regulations of the Cooperative and the Public Service Commission.

TYPE OF SERVICE: Single phase, 120/240 volts, 60 cycles, with a transformer capacity of 50 KVA or less.

RATES: As listed under Schedule 1, Residential, Farm, Non-Farm, Trailers and Mobile Homes.

<u>CONDITIONS</u>: Pursuant to the Cooperatives and the Public Service Commissions rules and regulations.

- 1. All extensions of up to 150 feet from the nearest facility shall be made without charge.
- 2. Extensions greater than 150 feet and up to 300 feet shall be made provided the consumer pays in advance a "Consumer Advance for Construction" of fifty (\$50.00) dollars in addition to any other charges required by the Cooperative of all consumers.
- 3. This advance shall be refunded at the end of one (1) year if the service continues for that length of time.
- 4. For extensions greater than 300 feet and less than 1000 feet from the nearest facility the "Consumer Advance for Construction" shall be made at the rate of \$2.60 per foot plus fifty (\$50.00) dollars.
- 5. Beyond 1000 feet extensions the "Consumer Advance for Construction" shall be made at the rate of \$2.60 per foot plus fifty (\$50.00) dollars.

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- 6. The cost of service and transformers is not included in any "Consumer Advance for Construction" for barns, silos, water and irrigation pumps or other buildings not classified as residential or commercial.
- 7. The "Consumer Advance for Construction" (Par. 4) for extensions 300 feet to 1000 feet and (Par. 5) beyond 1000 feet shall be refunded over a four (4) year period in equal amounts for each year the service is continued. HECKED

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 35. SERVICE TO BARNS, SILOS, WATER AND IRRIGATION PUMPS (Cont'd.)
 - 8. If the service is discontinued for a period of sixty (60) days, or should the barn, silo, water and irrigation pump or other buildings not classified as residential or commercial be removed and another not take its place within sixty (60) days or be replaced by a permanent structure the remainder of the advance shall be forfeited.
 - 9. Trailers and Mobile Homes added to this service shall meet the requirements of the National Electric Code, and the required fees, rules and regulations of the Cooperative. Any "Consumer Advance for Construction" remaining shall be returned as stated in the above conditions.
 - 10. Permanent residences added to this service shall meet the requirements of the National Electric Code and the required fees, rules and regulations of the Cooperative. Any remaining "Consumer Advance for Construction" shall be refunded when the residence receives permanent service.
 - 11. No refunds shall be made to any consumer who did not make the advance originally.

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ENERGY EMERGENCY CONTROL PROGRAM

RULES AND REGULATIONS

To provide a plan for reducing the consumption of electric energy on Nolin Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation System in the event of a severe coal shortage such as might result from a general strike in the coal mines.

All of the Tariffs, Rules and Regulations of Nolin Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation are subject to the Energy Emergency Control Program as filed with the Kentucky Energy Regulatory Commission (now Public Service Commission) on February 23, 1981 in Administrative Case No. 240 and as approved by the Public Service Commission order of March 31, 1981.

The complete Energy Regulatory Commission (now Public Service Commission) Administrative Order No. 240 is attached to and becomes part of the Nolin Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation Tariffs, Rules and Regulation manual on display in the office for public use.
